Darkness in Dar

DEFIANCE Tanzania has exploded into its most violent unrest in decades as furious citizens pour into the streets to reject what they call a stolen election. Jubilee declares Matiang'i ticket bearer, vows to join opposition

► Retired President Kenyatta's party resolves to work with Gachagua, Kalonzo.

Former Interior Cabinet Secretary Fred Matiang'i has formally joined the Jubilee party.

During a National Executive Council (NEC) meeting yesterday, Dr Matiang'i was also appointed a deputy party leader and endorsed as the presidential flag bearer in 2027.

Retired President Uhuru Kenyatta, who is the party leader, announced his commitment to work with the former Deputy President Rigathi Gachagua and Kalonzo Musyoka in the United Opposition.

The coalition also includes Martha Karua (People's Liberation Party), former Attorney General Justin Muri (Democratic Party), and Eugene Wamalwa (DAP-K), among others.

Jubilee resolved to have Matiang'i as the face of the party given that Uhuru would not be readily available.

Secretary General Jeremiah Kioni,

who read the resolutions of the NEC, said the party was committed to the principles and objectives of the United Opposition, working collectively with like-minded political formations to build a strong, united, and people-centered alternative.

"Accordingly, the NEC has nominated Dr Matiang'i to represent the Jubilee Party at the United Opposition Movement as he continues to popularise his candidature and champion a message of progressive leadership, integrity, and national unity," said Kioni.

He said Jubilee was committed to democratic renewal, institutional strengthening, and active participation in shaping the country's political and socio-economic future, and reiterated that the party continued to stand for the ideals of peace, inclusivity, and transformative governance.

"The NEC has approved a comprehensive plan to revamp and reenergise the Jubilee Party through a nationwide mass membership registration and mobilisation campaign. This initiative will focus on strengthening the party's grassroots networks, rebuilding public confidence, and reaffirming Jubilee's commitment to the values of unity, development, and democracy."

The party also stripped Nominated MP Sabina Chege of his position as the Whip at the National Assembly and replaced her with Nakuru West MP Samuel Arama.

Chege and East African Legislative Assembly MP Kanini Kega had tried taking away the party from Uhuru's grip, and had installed themselves as the acting party leader and secretary general respectively.

Turkana Senator James Lomenen was selected the party's Whip in the Senate while Kagwe Gichohi, who has been serving as the national treasurer, will now be the executive director.

Besides Matiang'i, other deputy

party leaders are Beatrice Gambo (strategy), Kados Muiruri (outreach) and Joseph Manje (programmes). The party created the four positions after the 2022 General Election after President William Ruto was removed as the party's sole deputy.

Matiang'i's move to formally join the Jubilee removed doubts on whether he could form his own political vehicle or join the United Progressive Alliance (UPA), which is popular in Nyamira County where he comes from.

At the same time, the decision to work with the Opposition leaders indicates that Uhuru and Gachagua would now have to work together despite their previous political differences, while at the same time giving direction to the party officials who could still be showing mixed signals towards the 2027 elections.

"The former President joined us in the meeting through Zoom. He informed us that he has been holding consultations with the leaders of the official Opposition and that Jubilee was part and parcel of the team that is determined to liberate this country," a NEC member disclosed.

Analysts say the announcement is good news for the opposition. Dr Elias Mokuia, a communications expert, says as long as the parties within the opposition remain united and field a joint presidential candidate, it did not matter what positions other principals got.

"If either of the parties decides to go alone, then that will split votes and may give the incumbent an advantage and that is what should matter to the opposition parties," he argues.

But Pius Kinuthia, a political analyst, warns that since most opposition parties are from the Mt Kenya region, their leaders could elbow each other out of the equation, leading to confusion and giving President William Ruto advantage.

Court: Inspector General has sole authority in managing police

The Inspector General (IG) of Police holds the exclusive mandate to employ, promote and discipline police officers, a court has ruled.

The Employment and Labour Relations Court declared that the IG's authority to manage matters within the National Police Service (NPS) is constitutionally protected.

In her judgment, Justice Hellen Wasilwa affirmed that "no person or body, including the National Police Service Commission (NPSC), may direct or interfere with the IG's command functions."

Citing Articles 245(1) and (2)(b), Justice Wasilwa further issued a prohibition order barring the NPSC from interfering with the recruitment of 10,000 police officers, declaring that such recruitment falls strictly under the operational mandate of the NPS as a national security organ.

"This court has issued an order prohibiting the NPSC from interfering with the recruitment of police officers gazetted last month since such processes fall exclusively under the operational mandate of the National Police Service," said Wasilwa.

The ruling settles long-standing tensions

between the two institutions, reinforcing the Inspector General's independence while delineating the Commission's administrative role in line with constitutional provisions.

The decision follows a petition by former Kilome MP Harun Mwau, filed on September 30, challenging the recruitment powers of the NPSC over uniformed police officers.

Mwau argued that the Commission's actions violated the Constitution and sought to annul several sections of the National Police Service Commission Act and the National Police Service Act.

Mwau maintained that recruitment should be handled solely by the NPS under the command of the IG.

He insisted that, under Articles 238, 239, and 245 of the Constitution, these powers lie with the National Police Service as a national security organ headed independently by the IG.

He sought over 20 declarations from the court, including orders nullifying Legal Notice No. 159 of September 19, 2025, which advertised new police recruitment under NPSC's oversight.

"Recruitment by national security organs

must reflect the diversity of the Kenyan people, and this is not a function that can be constitutionally delegated to the Commission. The NPSC is not a national security organ under Article 239(1) of the Constitution and therefore has no business recruiting uniformed officers," Mwau stated in his submission.

He further described the NPSC's actions as unconstitutional, ultra vires, and in breach of the IG's command powers under Article 245.

IG Douglas Kanja and the NPS, through lawyers Paul Nyamodi and Martin Gitonga, supported Mwau's petition.

Constitutional distinctions

"The 1st Respondent (IG) is a constitutional office established under Article 245(1) of the Constitution and it is mandated by the Constitution to exercise independent command over the National Police Service, the 2nd Respondent herein," Nyamodi told the court.

Wasilwa outlined the constitutional distinctions between the IG and the NPSC.

She noted that the NPSC is not a national security organ under Article 239(1), and that re-

ruitment by national security organs under Article 232(g) can only be conducted by the organs themselves. "Under Article 245(2)(b) and (4)(c), no person may give direction to the Inspector General regarding employment, assignment, promotion, suspension, or dismissal of any member of the Service," she held.

Wasilwa affirmed that the NPS, which comprises the Kenya Police Service and the Administration Police Service, must independently carry out its constitutional functions, including maintaining professionalism, discipline, competence, integrity, and respect for human rights (Articles 234(a) and (b)).

The court also clarified that while the NPSC may appoint, recruit, transfer, or promote persons holding administrative offices in the Service (Articles 246(1) and 246(2)(b)), there are two distinct classes of personnel: those under the IG's independent command and those under the administrative remit of the NPSC (Articles 238(2) and 239(1)).

Wasilwa noted "there have been no orders of force, and that is the guarantee of the law."

In the face of growing frustration over the fate of missing Kenyan activists Bob Njagi and Nicholas Oyoo, a coalition of civil society groups and human rights defenders has petitioned the European Union (EU) to suspend funding to the Ugandan government and impose sanctions.

The petition addressed to the EU delegation in both Kenya and Uganda and the European External Action Service in Brussels, urges the bloc to take

immediate action against Uganda for what it terms as "continued violation of human rights and international law."

Some of the rights groups that have signed the petition include Free Kenya Movement, Amnesty International Kenya, the Law Society of Kenya, Vo-

cal Africa, the Pan-African Human Rights Network, and the 6.25 Movement, among others.

For the distraught families of Njagi and Oyoo, this has been a rather torturous and agonizing month since the news of their kin's abduction hit on October 1.

The two activists had travelled to Uganda to attend a political rally organized by Ugandan politician Robert Kyagulanyi, popularly known as Bobi Wine, when the unthinkable happened.

It has been tough days and sleepless nights for the families as they try to keep hope alive that their loved ones will one day resurface. Each passing day without news of their whereabouts, however, pushes them to fear for the worst.

"It has not been easy for my young family. I have been spending sleepless nights wondering what happened to him. Every time my phone rings, I expect good news, but nothing this far. My world came to a standstill the day I saw the news of their abduction," Njagi's wife, Christine, recently told *The Standard* from her Kitengela home.

Oyoo's brother Nicholas Ochieng says the family is living in anguish.

"It is more difficult for us now that the military and police have denied having the two in custody. This makes us wonder where they are. Are they alive or taken elsewhere?" said Ochieng.

Auditor General flags massive irregularities in Ketraco payout

Auditor-General Nancy Gathungu has cited massive irregularities in the Sh12.99 billion payment for wayleave compensation by the Kenya Electricity Transmission Company (Ketraco) in seven donor-funded projects.

A forensic audit before Parliament covering 13 financial years running from 2010/11 to 2022/23 has indicated that compensation was budgeted at Sh17.02 billion out of which Sh4.03 billion remains outstanding to date.

Gathungu's audit was expected to establish the accuracy of the long outstanding wayleave compensations, in addition to Ketraco's compliance with the law.

"Electricity transmission infrastructure is critical for national energy security and economic transmission. Wayleave compensation ensures Project Affected Persons (PAPs) are lawfully and fairly compensated for land, crops and structures affected by high-voltage transmission lines. Persistent arrears and weak controls in this area risk project delays, litigation and financial loss to government," the audit notes.

Other issues raised by the audit included the huge variance between Resettlement Action Plan (RAP) and compensation amount, missing documentation for the outstanding way-

leave compensation, irregular compensation based on revaluation as well as overvaluation and overpayment of parcels of land.

The company also lacked guidelines on land revaluations or renegotiations, it failed to provide criteria used in sampling parcels of land to be valued and did not support payment vouchers.

The projects include Olkaria-Lessos-Kisumu (OLK) transmission line worth Sh5.58 billion out of which Sh2.27 billion is yet to be paid and the Sh2.62 billion Ethiopia-Kenya line, out of which Sh2.31 billion has been settled.

Others include Kenya-Tanzania line costing Sh1.64 billion of which Sh1.3 billion has been settled, the Kenya-Uganda line worth Sh1.84 billion with Sh478.7 million pending and Turkwel-Ortum-Kitale line costing Sh865.3 million that has Sh650.8 million settled.

There is also the Nairobi Ring (Suswa-Isinya) Sh2.2 billion of which Sh146.36 million remains unpaid, Kenya Power Transmission System Improvement Programme project worth Sh2.27 billion with Sh263.68 million pending and Machakos-Konza line Sh55.4 million out of which Sh29.81 million has been paid.

Estimated cost of resettlement was Sh283.1 million while the final compensation was Sh2.2 billion. [Irene Githinji]

Suluhu's location unknown as election violence rocks Tanzania

► Citizens protest the election that they say is skewed and call for its cancellation.

► Whereabouts of the President and senior government officials remain unknown.

Violence continued for a second day in several of Tanzania's major cities as the country remained under total lockdown and a communication blackout. Police shot and killed two people at Namanga township yesterday afternoon.

Chaos erupted at the border post when police chased protesters from Tanzania into the Kenyan side, where demonstrators torched banners and posters of President Samia Suluhu Hassan. Tanzanian police lobbed tear gas canisters and fired live bullets as Kenyan and Tanzanian youth pelted them with stones.

Two protesters — John Kahindi, a local Kenyan businessman, and Tanzanian national Kabuli Balayi — were fatally shot. Their bodies were transferred to a local mortuary, while two others, including a Kenyan police officer, sustained serious injuries.

In Tanzania, mainstream media outlets have been banned from covering the protests, and the whereabouts of senior government officials — including the President — remain unknown.

"We hear she may have relocated to Zanzibar. If this pressure is sustained, she will have to give in and call off these elections. Tanzanians have been patient people, but they are now saying enough is enough," a source told *The Standard*.

Police imposed an overnight curfew in Dar es Salaam — a city of more than seven million — on Wednesday, as internet access was cut nationwide. The blackout continued yesterday.

Demonstrators occupied major towns, targeting and destroying property belonging to senior officials of the ruling Chama Cha Mapinduzi (CCM) party as they demanded the cancellation of last week's presidential polls.

"Hali ni mbaya (the situation is bad). So far, it is chaotic, and police stations have been burned in Dar es Salaam, Mbeya, Arusha, Tunduma, Mwanza, Kahama and other towns," a source said by phone.

In Mwanza, petrol stations were set ablaze and shops vandalised by angry protesters. Riots were also reported in Sirare, Namanga and other towns along

the Kenya-Tanzania border.

Protesters are said to be exploiting a standoff between the army and the police, with the former reportedly warning against the shooting or maiming of peacefully picketing citizens.

Although a dusk-to-dawn curfew was announced, it was largely ignored as running battles continued late into the night on Wednesday and were expected to resume yesterday.

Reuters quoted witnesses saying dozens of protesters returned to the streets of Mbagala, Gongo la Mboto and Kiluvya on Thursday morning, where police fired gunshots and tear gas before the army intervened.

The UK's Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office reported that international flights had been cancelled to and from Dar es Salaam, while airports in Arusha and near Mount Kilimanjaro were closed.

According to Reuters, some protesters coordinated plans for further demonstrations via the Zello app, which allows smartphones to function like walkie-talkies.

Conflicting figures

Conflicting figures of those killed by security forces have emerged. Some sources put the death toll at more than 30. Human rights activist Tito Magoti told Reuters he had verified at least five deaths from Wednesday's protests. A diplomatic source said there were credible reports of at least 10 people killed in Dar es Salaam alone.

A heavy security presence on Wednesday did little to deter thousands who swarmed the streets of Dar es Salaam, Mbeya, Mwanza, Tarime and other towns to denounce the polls.

Sources indicated that voter turnout was likely below 30 per cent. In several polling stations, rioters reportedly overpowered clerks and destroyed ballot boxes and election materials.

In Mwanza, youth chanting "We want our country back" set Nyamanoro Police Station ablaze. In Dar es Salaam, protesters hurled stones at police, blocked roads and torched vehicles.

Tanzanians voted on 29 October in an election widely dismissed as one-sided after two main opposition candidates — Tundu Lissu of Chama cha Demokrasia na Maendeleo (Chadema) and Luhaga Mpina of ACT-Wazalendo — were barred from running.

Although the High Court dismissed charges against Mpina in August, the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) later disqualified him, declaring him "unfit" to contest on integrity grounds. There is no avenue for appealing presidential results in Tan-

zania, unlike in Kenya where candidates may petition the Supreme Court.

Verified videos showed largely peaceful demonstrations in Dar es Salaam, Mbeya, Tunduma, Tanga and Mwanza before anti-riot police attacked protesters, sparking violent clashes.

Ahead of the vote, Amnesty Inter-

national warned that Tanzanian authorities had intensified repression of the opposition, journalists and civil society.

Yesterday, AFP quoted a diplomatic source saying "upwards of 30 people" might have been killed, though this could not be independently verified due to the ongoing lockdown.

"It's unprecedented. Where we go from here is unclear with Hassan's status uncertain," the source said. AFP also reported unrest spreading to Songwe and Arusha, the East African Community headquarters.

The US Embassy in Dar es Salaam yesterday warned its citizens to avoid unnecessary movement due to the violence, citing a "widespread internet blackout."

Diplomatic sources told AFP that unrest persisted into the night despite the curfew, as checkpoints were set up across major cities. The army was deployed Wednesday

night to enforce the 12-hour curfew.

Schools and offices were shut yesterday, and civil servants were instructed to work from home. Local media made no mention of the violence, and newspapers were absent from the streets.

INEC said vote counting was still under way and that results would be released within three days.

According to Africa Intelligence, much of the anger online has been directed at President Samia's son, Abdul, accused of heading an informal police-intelligence task force overseeing election security. The unit has been blamed for recent abductions of government critics, including a popular influencer known as Niffer.

Two deaths

Amnesty International said late on Wednesday it had independently verified at least two protest-related deaths, describing the situation as "deeply disturbing" and warning of a high risk of escalation.

Once hailed as a reformist, President Samia has overseen what Amnesty describes as a "wave of terror" — including enforced disappearances, torture and extrajudicial killings of opposition figures.

Lissu, her chief challenger, remains on trial for treason and faces a possible death sentence. His party, Chadema, was banned from fielding candidates after refusing to sign an electoral code of conduct without reforms. The only other serious contender, Mpina of ACT-Wazalendo, was later disqualified on technicalities — leaving minor parties supportive of the President to contest.

Reuters also reported that government spokesman Gerson Msigwa directed all civil servants to work from home on Thursday unless their duties required physical presence.

I will not give up the struggle, says Lissu as he gets democracy award

- ▶ Tanzania opposition leader is being detained amid trial for treason charges.

Tanzania Opposition leader, Tundu Lissu, has been recognised as a champion of democracy amid increasing pressure on the President Samia Suluhu, whose government wants him jailed for treason.

Lissu's award by the Democracy Union of Africa (DUA) forum was received on his behalf by Chadema International Secretary, Deogratius Munishi, who also read the detained leader's acceptance speech.

Lissu vowed to fight on, saying he would not be deterred by Suluhu's administration high handedness.

"Word has reached me that you have honoured me with Akufu-Ado Democracy Award 2025. Even

though details are sketchy because communication with the outside world is impossible due to censorship and round the clock surveillance by prison guards and CCTV cameras, please allow me to thank you for this important award," read Munishi.

"No prison walls will ever be strong enough to prevent the mighty

strings of freedom from breaking through. Out of this pain and despair, a democratic Tanzania will be born."

According to Lissu, Chadema members and supporters and the people of Tanzania have been under constant attack from "Samia Suluhu's dictatorship".

He said in the past two years, party

leaders and activists have been kidnapped, murdered or disappeared, many more have been illegally detained and tortured in police cells and secret chambers operated by intelligence and paramilitary security apparatus.

"In the past six months, I have been held in this maximum security prison charged with treason for calling for reforms of our electoral system. Chadema has been slapped with a worldwide ban on political activities by Samia-appointed High Court judge.

"We have been hit with a ban in participation of this General Election and any future elections for the next five years by Samia-appointed and controlled electoral commission," he stated.

Lissu noted that a few days ago, the party's vice chairperson was arrested at the gate of the High Court building in Dar es Salaam while going to attend his trial and is yet to be charged with any offence.

"This attack on a peaceful democratic movement is without precedent in our entire history," he said.

Buses, trucks halt travel to Tanzania after election chaos

Most transporters have suspended operations from Nairobi to Tanzania following political unrest after Wednesday elections in the neighbouring country.

Most booking offices at Nairobi's River Road area have been deserted for two days, with those in charge turning away those seeking to travel or send parcels.

"We have suspended the operation until further notice for the security of our vehicles and we will wait until the situation is assured," said Shaban Ngadaya, a staff at One B company.

"At the moment, passengers who are not Tanzanians are not allowed to cross the Namanga border yet those were the majority of our customers."

"The last vehicles that left Nairobi went on Monday and have not returned because of the curfew," said staff from another company.

At the same time, the operators claim they had been warned by insurance companies in Tanzania that long-distance buses would not be insured during the elections period.

Also affected are trucks that deliver foodstuff to the Wakulima Market in Nairobi, among other areas.

"60 per cent of the goods we sell come from Tanzania, but for two days, vehicles have not crossed the border," said market chairman Maina Nyaga. [Plemon Ng'enh]

Sakaja defends billions spent by governors on bursaries

► Senators questioned why counties were issuing bursaries, saying the responsibility lies with the national government.

► The Nairobi governor argued counties were complementing the State in ensuring that bright and needy students go to school.

Nairobi Governor Johnson Sakaja has defended counties for offering bursaries to students despite this being a role of the national government.

Sakaja, who appeared before the Senate Education Committee, was responding to senators who questioned the decision by governors across the 47 counties to include bursaries in their budgets, yet this is not a devolved function.

The governor told the committee, chaired by Nominated Senator Betty Montet, that counties have to ensure bright and needy students are able to go to school by giving them bursaries, since this role cannot be left to the na-

tional government alone.

"In Nairobi County, we have spent Sh1.8 billion on school bursaries in the last two years, compared to Sh3 billion used by previous administrations over 10 years. We have no option but to ensure that needy and bright students get an education," said Sakaja.

Nominated Senator Catherine Mumma sought to know why counties were giving bursaries to students, adding that counties should only do so if they receive a conditional grant from the government.

Paying bills

Mumma argued that counties were effectively paying bills on behalf of the national government, and that for counties to take on additional responsibilities, they should receive extra allocations.

She further said counties could not claim they were providing social protection by issuing bursaries to students. "Counties should not give bursaries to students because this is a national government role.

"They should only do so if they get additional allocations through a conditional grant; otherwise, they will be paying bills for the national govern-

ment, which should not be the case," said Mumma.

Sakaja responded that most counties did not view the issuance of bursaries as interference with national government roles but rather as a complementary effort, since the government was already building classrooms and employing and paying teachers.

The Governor said the issue of bursaries was political in nature, adding that it would be politically suicidal for any governor to declare they would not issue bursaries to deserving students in their counties on the basis

that it was a national government function.

"In Nairobi County, we have given bursaries to 134,000 deserving students. What would happen if we said we were not going to support them in their studies? That is why no governor would dare say they will not offer bursaries, since it would be politically suicidal," said Sakaja.

Nairobi Senator Edwin Sifuna took Sakaja to task over the shortage of Early Childhood Development Centres in some wards in Nairobi, noting that the deficit was affecting learning activities.

He cited areas such as Ruai, Korocho, and Kayole Central, which each have only one centre.

Sifuna also asked Sakaja whether he was aware that 70 per cent of children in Nairobi attend informal schools, meaning only 30 per cent in public institutions benefit from the school feeding programme.

He said it was unfair to spend billions of shillings to serve only a small segment of the city's children.

"The Nairobi county government is spending billions of shillings to feed only 30 per cent of children in public schools, while 70 per cent who attend informal schools are not beneficiaries. This defeats the whole purpose of the project," said Sifuna.

Sakaja said the county government is mapping out public schools located near informal learning institutions as a short-term measure to enable children from informal settlements to access meals during lunchtime under the Dish na County initiative.

He said that of the 210 public schools in Nairobi, 17 central kitchens currently serve 316,000 learners, and that to include all informal schools, the county would require 69 more kitchens to meet its targets.

OPERATING ENVIRONMENT

During the reporting period, the operating environment was characterized by continued steady economic growth, supported by a rebound in the agricultural sector, sustained infrastructure investments, and expanding industrial activity. These factors collectively sustained economic momentum and drove increased electricity demand, culminating in a record national peak demand of 2,316 MW on 12th February 2025.

KenGen remained steadfast in its commitment to providing reliable and affordable clean energy to power Kenya's economic growth. The Company continued to play a leading role in the energy sector, contributing 59% of the country's electricity consumption.

Our generation portfolio, comprising geothermal, hydro, wind, and thermal power plants with a total installed capacity of 1,786 MW, generated 8,482 GWh during the year, an increase of 1% from 8,383 GWh in 2024. This growth was primarily driven by the resumption of operations at Muhoroni Power Plant and favorable hydrological conditions, both of which strengthened system reliability and enhanced grid stability, particularly in the western region of Kenya.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

Total revenue remained broadly stable at KShs 56,098 million for the year ended 30th June 2025, compared to KShs 56,297 million in the prior year. The marginal decline was mainly attributable to lower geothermal and steam revenues, partially offset by growth in diversified income streams and higher pass-through recoveries. The increase in pass-through revenue was driven by greater dispatch from Kipevu III and the resumption of operations at the Muhoroni Power Plant. Revenue from diversified sources grew significantly by 235%, largely reflecting the successful completion of geothermal consultancy work in Eswatini during the year.

Operating expenses decreased by 11%, from KShs 39,318 million to KShs 35,138 million, reflecting the impact of ongoing cost optimization initiatives. This reduction was primarily driven by lower depreciation and amortization charges, and a decline in overhead costs resulting from continued implementation of efficiency measures.

Net foreign exchange and fair valuation gains rose to KShs 1,453 million, compared to a loss of KShs 722 million in 2024. The improvement was largely driven by the strengthening of the Kenya Shilling against major currencies during the year compared to previous period.

Finance costs declined by 20%, from KShs 2,806 million to KShs 2,254 million, reflecting continued loan repayments and a lower debt balance. Interest income eased slightly by 2%, from KShs 4,202 million to KShs 4,110 million, as a result of the general decline in interest rates.

Profit Before Tax increased by 41%, from KShs 10,947 million in 2024 to KShs 15,473 million for year ended 30th June 2025. With an income tax charge of KShs 4,992 million, **Profit After Tax** grew by 54% to KShs 10,481 million, up from KShs 6,797 million in the previous year.

FUTURE OUTLOOK

Looking ahead, we remain well-positioned to accelerate the implementation of key renewable energy projects under our Corporate G2G 2034 Strategy. Our near-term pipeline of 252.82 MW continues to advance steadily, anchored by flagship projects such as the 63 MW Olkaria I Rehabilitation, the 42.5 MW Seven Forks Solar Project, and the Gogo Hydro Power Plant Upgrade (8.6MW). These projects, alongside the Wellhead Leasing Geothermal Project (58.42MW), and Olkaria VII Geothermal Power Project (80.3 MW) in the medium term, will strengthen grid reliability, stimulate industrial growth, and advance Kenya's transition to a clean and sustainable energy future.

Our diversification agenda is also gaining pace, led by the Green Energy Park; a pioneering industrial ecosystem designed to power green industrialization through direct geothermal energy use. This initiative will position Kenya as a strategic hub for industries seeking to achieve low-carbon manufacturing and contribute to the nation's carbon neutrality goal.

Regionally, the upcoming geothermal drilling project in Ngozi, Tanzania, marks a pivotal step in extending our expertise and reinforcing KenGen's leadership as Africa's foremost geothermal developer. Together, these undertakings embody our commitment to delivering sustainable growth and climate-conscious progress for generations to come.

The Board is pleased to recommend a first and final dividend for the year of KShs 0.90 (2024: KShs 0.65) per ordinary share of KShs 2.50.

If approved by shareholders at the Annual General Meeting, the dividend will be paid, less withholding tax where applicable on or about 12th February 2026 to the shareholders whose names appear in the Register of Members at the close of business on 27th November 2025.

State moves to allow emergency deliveries in Level 2 and 3 hospitals

► Lower-tier facilities may soon be able to manage emergency deliveries pending legal changes.

► Administrative action will ease restrictions, ensure reimbursements and improve maternal care access in rural areas.

The government is considering easing childbirth restrictions at lower-tier health facilities and may soon permit emergency deliveries to take place at Level 2 and Level 3 hospitals.

But the Ministry of Health must first issue a directive allowing these facilities to handle emergency births, reversing an earlier policy that restricted deliveries to Level 4 hospitals and above.

Director-General of Health, Dr Patrick Amoth, told the National Assembly's Committee on Health that guidance has already been issued to the Kenya Health Professionals and Digital Council (KHPDC) and the Digital Health Agency, recognising Level 2 and Level 3 facilities as eligible for emergency delivery reimbursements.

"This means the facilities will now qualify for government compensation when managing emergency maternal cases," he explained.

The Committee will review the Ministry's proposal once a detailed financial and legal justification is submitted,

paving the way for potential amendments to allow lower-level facilities to provide maternity services under the Primary Healthcare (PHC) package.

"The issues raised by Members align with concerns identified through the Kenya Health Information System, particularly regarding deliveries and other services. Consequently, I advised the CS to authorise Level 2 and Level 3 facilities to have delivery beds for emergency purposes," Dr Amoth said.

Dr Amoth noted that Health Cabinet Secretary Aden Duale has issued formal letters to the CEOs of KHPDC, the Digital Health Agency, and the Social Health Authority (SHA) to implement the directive, and corrective measures have been taken to address service delivery gaps at these facilities.

His remarks responded to concerns raised by Nandi Women Representative Cynthia Muge, who cited cases where Level 2 and 3 facilities performing maternity services were recorded as having zero beds by KHPDC, leading to rejected reimbursement claims despite handling dozens of deliveries monthly.

For instance, one health centre in Trans Nzoia recorded 74 deliveries between July and September, yet claims were rejected because the system classified it as a "zero-bed" facility, while another recorded 46 deliveries with no reimbursement.

"These are real mothers delivering in public facilities, yet because the system says they have no beds, they are not reimbursed. This is unacceptable and

must be fixed urgently," Muge said.

Duale acknowledged the concerns, noting that lower-tier facilities are often the only practical option for expectant mothers in remote areas. "Some Level 2 and Level 3 facilities, particularly in remote villages, are the only accessible option for mothers in labor. Once a mother goes into labor, she cannot travel long distances to the nearest Level 4 hospital," he said.

He added that the Ministry is engaging the regulator to ensure this is done properly without duplicating agency mandates.

Some MP Dr James Nyikal questioned the rationale behind restricting deliveries to higher-tier facilities, noting that women have historically delivered at Level 2 and 3 hospitals. "If there are legal provisions that are prohibitive, then our team must address them. Amending the law may not be immediate, but it is necessary," he said.

The CS explained that while legal amendments are being pursued, immediate administrative action is underway, guided by the Director-General.

The directive is expected to ease pressure on higher-level hospitals, reduce referral delays, and improve timely access to maternal care, especially in rural and underserved areas where the nearest Level 4 facility may be far away. However, expanding the full PHC package to permanently include maternity services at Level 2 and 3 facilities would require significant financial resources. Dr Amoth noted that legal amendments recognising these services could cost an additional Sh4.9 billion annually.

Nyeri Town MP Duncan Matherenge suggested additional funding may not be needed, as the Social Health Insurance Fund already provides a maternity package.

Ruto promises unity, development as he courts Western votes

President William Ruto has intensified his efforts to consolidate support in the Western region, seeking to inherit the crucial voting base long commanded by the former ODM leader Raila Odinga.

During a development tour in the region, Ruto dismissed his opponents as weak and predicted an easy victory in the 2027 elections.

Speaking in Butere at the commissioning of the newly completed Butere Level Four Hospital, Ruto emphasised his commitment to national unity, ending tribalism, and addressing uneven development across the country, goals he said had been agreed upon with Raila before his passing.

"We lost our good Mzee Raila Odinga, and before his demise, I had reached out to him to unite the country under a broad-based government, and he accepted. In his respect, and God willing, I will ensure no region lags in development. Tribalism, divisive politics, and violence

will be things of the past," Ruto said.

In a move to inherit Raila's political base, the President urged ODM leaders to collaborate under the broad-based government to deliver services to their constituents. "We are working with leaders, such as CS Wycliffe Oparanya, Governor Fernandes Barasa, Butere MP Tindi Mwale, and others who were in Azimio, but we are now united. My plea is for us to work together and serve our people," he added.

Ruto dismissed opposition leaders, accusing them of offering nothing beyond tribalism and empty rhetoric. While launching the Malava-Samitsi-Navakholo road in Malava Constituency, he described his opponents as "clueless" and asserted that the only person who could have been a serious competitor was the late Raila Odinga. "These people have no plans, and sloganeering alone will not defeat me. The only real competitor would have been Raila, and I will easily defeat them in 2027," Ruto said.

During his visit, the President announced several development initiatives for Kakamega County. He pledged to connect 34,000 households to electricity, allocating Sh2.5 billion for the programme. Additionally, Sh2.2 billion has been set aside for road construction, while Sh1 billion will complete the stalled Kakamega Level Six Hospital within nine months. Ruto also promised to finalise the Bukhungu Stadium project, pledging Sh1.4 billion.

The President committed to equipping the newly commissioned Butere County Hospital under the National Equipment Service Programme, with Sh150 million earmarked for medical equipment. Kakamega Governor Fernandes Barasa welcomed the support, highlighting its role in advancing universal healthcare.

"I am committed to completing all projects initiated by my predecessor, Wycliffe Oparanya. This facility will serve the southern part of Kakamega, and I thank the President for releasing an

additional Sh1 billion to finish the referral hospital. Residents will soon access full medical services here," Barasa said.

Barasa also indicated that ODM supporters in the region would rally behind Ruto in 2027. "As the ODM county chairperson, our party leader left us in the broad-based government. We will remain united and support President Ruto's reelection bid," he stated.

The Central Organisation of Trade Unions Secretary-General Francis Atwoli urged continued support for Ruto, noting that the region has benefited significantly from development under his government. Several leaders, including Prime Cabinet Secretary Musalia Mudavadi, National Assembly Speaker Moses Wetang'ula, CS Oparanya, and MPs Tindi Mwale, Raphael Wanjala, and Bishop Titus Khamala, pledged to remain in the broad-based government and back Ruto beyond 2027.

Former SHA boss Ingasira, three others face Sh17.5m fraud charges

▶ Robert Ingasira and three others are accused of orchestrating fraudulent claims.

▶ Prosecutors allege the scheme diverted over Sh17 million through Archprime Medical Clinic to the accused.

NANCY GITONGA, NAIROBI

Former acting Social Health Authority (SHA) Chief Executive Officer Robert Ingasira and three others have been charged with defrauding the State agency of Sh17.5 million through allegedly fraudulent medical claims.

Ingasira was charged alongside Arthur Otula, Rosemary Daraja, and Peter Abuna over the alleged loss, which prosecutors claim was routed through Archprime Medical Clinic in Oyugis, Homa Bay County.

The four appeared before Milimani Chief Magistrate Lucas Onyina, where they denied seven counts, including conspiracy to defraud, falsification of health information, acquisition and use of proceeds of crime, and uttering false documents—offences contrary to the Penal Code, the Social Health Insurance Act, and the Proceeds of Crime and Anti-Money Laundering Act.

Falsified claims

According to the charge sheet, the accused, jointly with others not before the court, allegedly conspired to defraud the Social Health Authority of Sh17,591,473 by submitting falsified medical claim documents purporting to be genuine between October 2024 and May 2025.

The charges relate to an alleged fraudulent scheme in which false medical records for patients identified as Edna Amondi Dulo, Maureen Atieno, and Alice Akinyi Oburu were submitted to SHA, purportedly as genuine treatment claims.

The prosecution alleges that payments were processed to Archprime Medical Clinic, owned by the first accused, Otula, benefiting his co-accused, including the two former SHA chief executives.

State Counsel Victor Owino told the court that the funds were irregularly claimed and paid on account of fictitious patients and falsified medical records.

“The alleged fraud was executed through manipulation of health claim forms and medical records submitted to the SHA with the intent to obtain benefits not lawfully due,” the court heard.

Owino urged the court to consider the large sum involved when setting bail, although he did not oppose the release of the accused.

“We are not opposed to bail but ask the court to take into account public interest and the amount allegedly misappropriated from public funds,” he stated.

Defence pleads

Chief Magistrate Onyina released each of the four accused on a cash bail of Sh500,000 or an alternative bond of Sh800,000, each with one contact person as surety.

“The accused shall be released on a cash bail of Sh500,000 each or a bond of Sh800,000 with one surety. They must attend court as required and must not interfere with witnesses,” ruled Onyina.

Meanwhile, the court issued summons for former SHA CEO Elijah Wachira, who also faces related charges, after he failed to appear for plea-taking. He has been ordered to present himself on November 11, 2025.

Defence lawyers Peter Wanyama, Timothy Okello, and Ken Echesa pleaded for lenient bond terms, insisting their clients were not flight risks and had cooperated fully with investigators.

“The accused persons have been cooperative and are willing to com-

ply with all court conditions,” said Okello.

Echesa urged the court to consider Ingasira’s service to the institution, describing him as a career public servant deserving leniency.

Daraja’s lawyer requested compassion, noting she is a jobless mother of a five-year-old child with minimal involvement in the case.

The court directed the prosecution to supply all witness statements and documentary evidence to the defence within 21 days, ahead of the pre-trial hearing scheduled for November 11, 2025.

Mystery clouds destination of Sh8.2b Indian Ocean drug haul

The destination of the Sh8.2 billion methamphetamine haul seized in the Indian Ocean remains unknown as detectives race against time to identify those behind the trafficking operation.

While Kenya, Tanzania, and Uganda have been mentioned as possible destinations, investigators are also focusing on Mozambique, Zanzibar, Comoros, and Mauritius in their ongoing probe.

Six suspects — Iranian nationals identified as Imtiyaz Daryayi, Rahim Baksh, Nadeem Jadgal, Jasem Darzadeh Nia, Imran Baloch, and Hassan Baloch, remain in custody. Detectives have, however, struggled to obtain crucial information

from them regarding the source and destination of the narcotics.

“We are still at the preliminary stage, but ultimately we aim to establish both the origin and final destination of the drugs,” said an anti-narcotics officer.

A Mombasa court on Monday granted police 30 more days to hold the Iranians after the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) requested additional time to complete investigations. The suspects were not charged.

The 1,024 kilogrammes of methamphetamine were intercepted 630 kilometres east of Mombasa on October 23. The vessel, *MV Igol*, was

reportedly sailing to an unknown destination within the Indian Ocean region when it was seized by the Kenya Navy and the Kenya Coast Guard Service, in collaboration with the Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) and international partners.

DCI Director Mohamed Amin confirmed that investigations are ongoing, adding that the drugs’ exact destination remains unclear. “At this stage, we cannot speculate, but we believe the narcotics were destined for East Africa or another Indian Ocean nation,” said Amin.

The seizure came just two weeks after Kenya destroyed chemicals used in methamphetamine

production at the East African Portland Cement plant in Athi River, Machakos County.

The precursor chemicals were discovered in a laboratory in Namanga, Kajiado County, in September last year. A transnational network was allegedly setting up a large-scale drug manufacturing facility targeting local and international markets.

During the destruction exercise, DCI official Bernard Walumoli reaffirmed Kenya’s commitment to dismantling drug trafficking networks. Six suspects, three Kenyans, two Nigerians, and a Mexican, were arrested in connection with the Namanga laboratory. [Hudson Gumbi]

State to spend Sh4.2bn on IDs before 2027 polls

▶ Government to issue three million new IDs and renew three million others.

▶ Immigration PS says it will cost Sh700 to print each of the six million cards.

The government will spend Sh4.2 billion to print six million national identification cards (IDs) ahead of the 2027 General Election in a move that could influence the outcome of the polls.

Immigration and Citizen Services Principal Secretary Belio Kipsang on Thursday said that of the lot, three million will be new IDs while the other three million are projected to be renewals.

Dr Kipsang explained that it will cost Sh700 to print one card with the cost being inclusive of Sh400 for the card holder and Sh300 for the im-

printing of other details.

Appearing before the National Assembly's Security and Administration Committee, Kipsang said the move by the government to relax the historical vetting exercise before the issuance of IDs, especially in border counties, will lead to an increase in the number of identification cards issued out, a development also premised on the government's move to waive the Sh1,000 ID card replacement fee.

"We are projecting to register six million identification cards going forward at a total cost of Sh4.2 billion... There is usually a high number of people registering to renew their identification cards towards an election and we expect that the relaxation of vetting will also see new people register for the cards," said the PS.

He said the vetting exercise had negatively affected the requisition of new IDs by Kenyans in 15 border counties, among them Kwale, Moyale, Taita Taveta and Homa Bay as well as in areas such as Tiati in Baringo County.

"In a county like Homa Bay, you find that you have people aged between fifty to sixty years who have no IDs because they have long been excluded. In Taita Taveta and Kwale, you find a scenario where the children in a family have identity cards but their parents do not. This is because of factors such as cross-border intermarriages," said Kipsang.

"I am sure that we will be able to address the historical exclusion of peoples in such counties."

Suna West MP Peter Masara, however, pushed the PS to explain how

he arrived at the figure of six million ID cards.

"On what statistics are you basing your projections? Are they based on the figures by the National Registration Bureau? In this country, we have a problem of people just throwing around numbers," posed Masara.

To which the PS responded: "The projections are based on demand... last year we issued out two million cards and, historically, it has been proven that as you go towards an election, the number goes up."

The revelation by Kipsang was

prompted by Sotik MP Francis Sigei who had sought to know the current status of ID and passports issuance. He had also questioned what would be the financial implication of the recent directive by the State.

Earlier this year, Interior Cabinet Secretary Kipchumba Murkomen officially gazetted the removal of the Sh300 fee for new IDs.

In a Gazette Notice dated March 19, the Ministry of Interior and National Administration amended the previous charges to zero.

The move followed the Presidential directive that eliminated vetting requirements for ID applicants from Northern Kenya, a process that had long been criticized as discriminatory.

At the same time, the Gabriel Tongoyo-led committee put Kipsang to task over a multi-billion shilling pending bill haunting his department.

The House team pointed out that the department was choking under the weight of a total Sh6.3 billion in pending bills of which Sh5.9 billion was incurred from expenditure in the 2024/2025 financial year.

"The department has been struggling with pending bills year in year out. What has been contributing to this?" asked Tongoyo.

The PS however explained that the issue was one of historically inherited debt which was now affecting operations at the department.

Results for the year ended 31 July 2025.

The Group achieved a 1.6% increase in turnover in its core business, reaching KSh 2,100 million (2024: KSh 2,066 million). This modest growth was mainly driven by rising demand in non-traditional markets such as South Africa, Namibia, Botswana, Zimbabwe and Malawi. However, the appreciation of the Kenyan Shilling against the US Dollar dampened growth when measured in local currency terms. Gross margin improved from 59% to 65%, supported by enhanced operational efficiency, particularly from lower power costs following major investments in solar energy infrastructure. Although fuel prices were generally lower during the year, there was a marked increase in the final quarter. The Nairobi Securities Exchange (NSE) and Dar-es-Salaam Stock Exchange (DSE) maintained their recovery trends, positively influencing the Group's investment portfolio. As a result, the Group recorded unrealized gains of KSh 68 million on NSE-listed equities and KSh 52 million on DSE-listed equities. In addition, dividend income increased compared to the prior year, reflecting stronger market performance. The Group's earnings per share increased from Shs 3.31 to Shs 3.94.

Dividends

The Directors have proposed a final dividend of KSh 2.00 per share (2024: KSh 1.70 per share), amounting to a total of KSh 509,703,970 (2024: KSh 433,248,375). The dividend is to be paid to shareholders on record as of the close of business on 26th November 2025 and will be payable on or around 18th December 2025.

Tanzania has joined the list of African countries rocked by election violence. The once tranquil African nation erupted on Wednesday when it conducted elections amid tension generated by the government's jailing of main opposition leader, Mr Tundu Lissu, and the decision to bar other opposition leaders from contesting.

The election was the first major test for President Samia Suluhu who ascended to the presidency constitutionally following the death of then President, Mr John Pombe Magufuli, in 2021. In the formative days of her presidency, Suluhu opened up democratic space by freeing opposition leaders who had been jailed by the Magufuli administration, including Lissu who, in 2020, was shot 16 times and later barred from returning to Tanzania after treatment.

Yet barely two years into her presidency, the president started vilifying and persecuting opposition leaders. Her decision to bar opposition leaders from the ballot has pushed the country to the edge of a precipice. Tanzania is at the same place that Kenya was in 2008, and where Cameroon and Ivory Coast are today.

While elections in the West signify peaceful change of guard in leadership, they are harbingers of death and chaos in Africa. African leaders must resolve to change this story of death and violence every electoral cycle.

The interests of Tanzania supersede those of Suluhu, which is why she must put the interests of the country first by doing the sensible thing: leading the way to a scaling down of hostilities.

The government may have quelled the violence that erupted on Wednesday by use of force, but the inescapable fact is that Tanzania will never be the same again. The people are increasingly getting aware of their rights, and will demand them forcefully if their leaders try to deny them those rights.

All said and done, Tanzania should be saved from descending to the level that Kenya did following the 2008 post-election dispute. The need for regional governments to step in and arrest the potentially dangerous situation cannot be gainsaid.

Kenyans will never forget that Tanzania contributed to ending the deadly violence that rocked the country in 2008 through former President Benjamin Mkapa who was part of the mediation team led by Kofi Annan. Kenya is hugely indebted to Tanzania and should spearhead efforts to restore calm in the neighbouring country.

Tanzania can even borrow the Kenyan example, which Mkapa helped to come with, of forming a coalition government—the path President Mwai Kibaki and the then opposition leader Raila Odinga took to cool the violence that claimed 1,300 lives and displaced over half a million people.

But Suluhu can also avert further chaos by calling for truce with her key political opponents such as Lissu and promising greater commitment to true democratic ideals. It is important for Suluhu and all Tanzanians to put their country first. Let them agree to end the violence and talk to each other.

Those who seek Raila's political mantle must carry his burden

"A wise ruler ought never to keep faith when by doing so it would be against his interests," wrote Niccolò Machiavelli. Though controversial, Raila Odinga's shifting alliances, which were often dismissed as betrayals, echo this principle. It means whoever wants to fit in Raila's political shoes must learn his manoeuvres and do better than him.

His ability to navigate Kenya's turbulent political waters and remain an insider in every regime since the 1997 elections has long defied easy explanation.

But Baba mastered a rare political art of being the government's fiercest critic while remaining its most indispensable insider.

In doing so, he embodied a paradox that few politicians survive—the ability to oppose power without being exiled from it, and to wield influence without always holding office. His political journey, marked by calculated compromise and principled defiance, reflects not inconsistency but a deep understanding of Kenya's shifting political terrain. From his presidential debut in 1997, Raila

carved out an inconsistent role. It was said that he was loved and loathed in equal measure. To his critics, he was an opportunist who traded opposition for influence. But to those who occupied State House after President Moi, Raila's importance only became apparent once they held power themselves.

President Mwai Kibaki, for instance, sought to cast Raila into political oblivion after the botched 2005 referendum and the contentious 2007 elections. The so-called "Kikuyu mafia", a semblance of the GEMA elite from the 1970s who once tried to block Moi's rise, believed they could finish Raila politically. They underestimated him.

To their astonishment, Raila emerged stronger, co-leading the country in a coalition government from 2008 to 2013. That government, born out of the ashes of post-election violence, was not just a power-sharing deal but also a national necessity. Yet even then, many dismissed Raila as someone who rode on the blood of Kenyans to negotiate power.

After 2013, it seemed Raila's political star had dimmed. But State House could only keep him out for five years. By the time the 2017 elections came around, the establishment was once again hankering for him. Within months of the vote, Raila was back through the famous handshake with President Uhuru Kenyatta.

That handshake marked the beginning of William Ruto's political troubles. Ruto, then Deputy President, vowed to send Raila "to Bondo." He castigated Uhuru for embracing Raila and hurled epithets like "Mzee wa

Kitendawili," "Mtu wa Waganga," and "mchawi." Yet, in a twist of fate, Ruto himself would later extend an olive branch to the man he once vilified.

What can we say? Raila's political genius lay in his duality. He opposed every regime, yet was always ready to join hands for the sake of the country. He wasn't just a critic. He was a builder. He kept regimes in check while contributing to national progress. This is not always a mean feat, but it is what made him a statesman.

Isn't that what the Opposition should be? Not just resistance for its own sake, but a readiness to fix what can be fixed from within, and to challenge what must be challenged from without. Raila embodied this doctrine. When duty called, he stepped in. When conscience demanded, he stepped out.

To inherit Raila's mantle will cost enduring the contradictions, the betrayals, the vilification, and still choose country over self. It is to understand that the Opposition is not a posture, but a responsibility.

Political philosopher Edmund Burke once said, "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing."

Raila always chose to do something. Whether in the streets or the corridors of power, he acted. And in doing so, he redefined what it means to be in the Opposition.

Although we never truly understood Raila's political doctrine until he left us, it is clear that whoever dares to inherit his legacy must be ready to bear the weight of his cross.

Women leaders should emulate Millie and talk about menopause openly

While introducing Members of Parliament during the burial of Raila Odinga, Mbita MP Millie Odhiambo said: "...I have a disease called menopause that has caught up with me, so if I forget to mention you, don't feel bad."

The burial took place on October 19, just a day after the world celebrated World Menopause Day, which is dedicated to raising awareness about menopause.

Menopause, a word derived from Greek, simply means "cessation of the monthly cycle". However, it is more complex than that. It is a hormonal storm raging through female bodies.

Understanding that menopause is a natural part of biological aging is important in a country where 'being menopausal' is often used as an insult. We attach value to women's ability to give birth — but that's not the end of a woman's life, neither does it devalue her.

Like many women's conditions, menopause is widely misunderstood or misdiagnosed.

According to sources, there are more than 50 symptoms related to menopause, including sleep disturbances, mood swings, weight change, hot flashes, night sweats, vaginal dryness, and more. Menopause can last several years and affects the physical, emotional, mental and social well-being. Studies suggest that one out of 10 women is likely to quit their job due to menopause-related symptoms.

Lack of awareness often leads to distress, relationship issues, and neglect of women's health needs. It is therefore important that we collectively educate ourselves. Knowledge fosters understanding, and understanding fosters empathy. It's important for women leaders like Ms Odhiambo to speak openly about menopause on

national platforms for several reasons.

It gives visibility to women's health, which is often overlooked in public policy — especially the issues related to midlife and aging. Odhiambo brought the issue onto the national agenda, making it hard to ignore.

She turned a personal yet widespread experience into a national issue of dignity, awareness, and inclusion. Hers is a powerful reminder that women's well-being belongs in public discourse — especially since women make up about 50.28 per cent of Kenya's population.

Seeing a woman leader confidently talking about going through menopause normalises and validates women's experiences and encourages others to speak up. It breaks the silence and reduces the stigma and misinformation that surrounds this natural transition.

During a recent conference on menopause, health experts called on the government to devel-

op a clear framework on menopause — one that integrates access to healthcare and mental well-being. They also urged the creation of healthier, more inclusive workspaces that empower women to contribute to nation-building without battling shame.

Women's bodies are not awkward spaces that should house silence. They are not taboo. It is not embarrassing to grow older.

When we keep speaking, we normalise. We create awareness, end shame, and build sustainable spaces where women show up unafraid — transitioning through all stages of life. We must stop weaponising natural processes against women.

Silence around women's reproductive systems and illnesses only fuels stigma. Just as we are normalising period conversations and treating menstrual products as essentials, not smuggled goods, we must also bring menopause into public discourse.

No more hush-hush tones or euphemisms like 'the change.' Let's also include younger women and girls in the conversation. Let's include men for they are part of women's lives in the workplace, at home, and society.

Women are the backbone of the nation, and menopause affects how they show up. Studies by the World Bank and the UNDP show that investing in women boosts education, health outcomes, and economic productivity.

For this to happen, women must unite across class and professions — from junior employees and high-ranking officials to leaders to those working at home or in the jua kali sector, share experiences and empower future generations. Let's talk more about menopause.

Despite painful legal defeats, Raila never lost faith in courts

There are men whose victories are not measured in titles won and offices held, but in the ideas they leave indelibly etched upon the conscience of a nation. Raila Odinga is one such man. His story, spanning over half a century of Kenya's political evolution, is one of struggle, loss, endurance, and faith. This is not in himself, but in the promise of institutions, justice, and posterity. His journey has often resembled that of the tragic hero in literature, wounded yet unyielding, battered yet believing.

To call him "broken but unbowed" is not to diminish his strength but to acknowledge the cost of conviction. His political life reads like a long trial. One in which the verdict often went against him. Every loss in court, every alleged stolen election, every betrayal, became another page in Kenya. He may not have won for himself but he has time and again won for the future.

First, very few Kenyan politicians have approached the courts with the constancy Raila has. After every electoral defeat; in 1997, 2007, 2013, 2017 and 2022, he turned not to violence, but to the Constitution. His belief that institutions could be reformed through engagement was itself a lesson in civility. In 2013, when the Supreme Court upheld Uhuru Kenyatta's victory, Raila famously said, "The court has spoken, we must move on."

It was not the language of defeat but the language of a democrat who understood that even flawed institutions must be strengthened through faith, not fury. In 2017, he returned to the same court renewed. And history was made. For the first time in Africa, a presidential election was nullified by a court of law. That decision, Raila Odinga versus Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission, did not hand him the presidency. It handed Kenya something greater—proof that law could tame power. Raila may have lost politically, but constitutionally, the nation won.

Secondly, to understand Raila's resilience, one must return to the Moi years. Detained without trial, tortured and silenced. Raila refused to recant his beliefs. His body bore the scars of state power, but his spirit did not bend. When Kenya trembled under the weight of a one-party state, Raila stood with the few like Gitobu Imanyara, among others, who dared to imagine multiparty democracy. He fought for space, for the idea that dissent is not treason.

Raila exemplified that the ballot is mightier than the bullet. Yes that citizenship means the right to question. The repealing of Section 2A of the Constitution in 1991, which restored multiparty politics, stands as one of the triumphs of that struggle. The freedom of speech we now take for granted was born in the silence of cells like the one he occupied at Nyayo House. In every era, he has carried the cross of misunderstanding. Like Prometheus who stole fire for humanity and was chained for it, Raila's suffering was for the public good.



Thirdly, it is often forgotten that Raila, the most vilified of Kenya's politicians, has never sued the media, not once. Raila understood that a free press, however harsh, is better than a censored one. In a country where public figures reach for lawyers at the first sign of criticism, his tolerance is a quiet lesson in liberalism. He never sought to silence his critics. His life illustrates that democracy must include the right to offend and to be offended. It is this tolerance that sustains open societies.

His narrative is a mosaic of near victories and moral triumphs. His 2002 "Kibaki Toshi" moment cemented national unity over personal ambition. His 2007 loss exposed the fragility of electoral justice and birthed the 2010 Constitution. His 2017 petition fortified judicial independence. Each defeat was paradoxically a national

advancement. Philosophically, he belongs to the school of those who see history as a long arc bending toward justice. He fights not for immediacy, but for inevitability. His politics is not of expediency, but of endurance. In law and in literature, such faith is rare. It is akin to the moral courage of Antigone, that of standing for what is right even when the state declares it wrong.

Lastly, to the impatient generation of Kenyan politics, Raila offers a hard lesson, that struggle is not a sprint but a relay. Each generation must carry the baton further, even if it cannot finish the race. His own life demonstrates that victory delayed is not victory denied and that sometimes, history rewards those who plant trees under whose shade they may never sit. In every courtroom he walked into, in every rally he addressed, in every loss he accepted with grace, Raila was teaching us something.

The legitimacy of power must always rest on the consent of the governed, and that when institutions falter, they must be fixed and not scattered. Today, as the tides of politics shift and younger faces take the stage, Raila's relevance remains. His vision of justice through law, of reform through resistance and of freedom through patience continues to shape Kenya's democratic DNA.

He may not have worn the crown, but he changed the kingdom. In the twilight of his career, Raila stood as a paradox, a man who had lost much yet given more. A man who had suffered defeat but bequeathed dignity. One who has been broken by the weight of politics yet unbowed in spirit.

Lifting logging ban has exposed President's doublespeak

The decision by President William Ruto to lift the ban on logging in Mau Forest complex and all the gazetted forests in the country risks reversing the gains that the country has made in curbing deforestation and enhancing environmental conservation. It also exposes Dr Ruto's apparent hypocrisy in matters of the environment.

While launching the Mau Complex Integrated Conservation and Livelihood Improvement Programme in Elburgon, Nakuru County, early this week, the President lifted the ban, claiming that the move will lead to the reviving of the timber and furniture industry, thereby creating job opportunities, which, according to him, had been crippled by the ban. Interestingly, the President went further to assert that the lifting of the logging ban would support his pet project of constructing affordable houses by enhancing the supply of local timber products and furniture.

Conscious of the sharp reactions the move would elicit from environmental activists and the general public, the President insisted that only aged trees would be cut.

It is quite apparent the lifting of the logging ban, which was imposed in 2018 to curb deforestation, may lead to wanton destruction of the key water towers. In the absence of properly laid down measures to ensure that only the mature trees will be harvested, unscrupulous individuals will engage in illegal logging and subsequent destruction of the forests.

It is imperative to note that Mau Forest is the country's lifeline; a source of over 10 rivers. The forest complex also supports wildlife. As such, tampering with Mau Forest, even remotely, is to threaten the country's ecological heat-beat.

Ruto's directive raises a pertinent question. Who will monitor the felling of trees to ensure that only mature trees are felled?

But even if the government monitors the process, it is likely that it will be turned into a cash cow for its officials who will solicit bribes from the loggers, hence letting them fell the trees recklessly.

Stopping deforestation forms one of Kenya's National Determined Contributions in reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 32 per cent by 2030 in line with the Paris Agreement signed in 2016, to which Kenya is a party. Therefore, increasing the country's forest cover through deliberate efforts such as planting of trees, besides protecting the existing forest cover is a crucial step in realising the Paris Agreement target.

This explains why Ruto has pledged to spearhead the planting of 15 billion trees by 2030. He has on a number of times reiterated this commitment on a global stage. For instance, during the 80th United Nations General Assembly in September this year, Ruto emphasised Africa's role in providing climate solutions rather than playing the victim. He has boasted of the country's concerted efforts in environmental conservation.

However, back home the situation is different. Lifting the ban on logging is clearly an act of double-speak. It is ironic that this move came two weeks after the country marked Mazingira Day on October 10, a day the government dedicated planting of trees. On this day, Ruto led the nation in planting trees at the State House. Why would the President, on the one hand, lead the country in planting trees and on the other allow logging in a key water tower like the Mau Complex?

Veteran newscaster Sammy Lui was betrayed by the system he faithfully served for many years

News of Sammy Lui's death made me remember a recent sad TV footage showing the veteran broadcaster, both hands raised towards Mt Kenya, standing on the ruins of what used to be his house in Woodley Estate after it was demolished by the Nairobi County Government.

It made me sad when I recalled how Lui served the powers that be with total dedication, devotion and commitment. I had the privilege of working with Lui at KBC in the late 1990s and early 2000s. I was the news editor and Lui was a newscaster

It was in the period before the 2002 General Election when a combined opposition brought to an end the monolithic Kanu party rule that we became extremely close despite being on opposing political sides.

And when the votes were tallied after the polls, his preferred presidential candidate won with a landslide, beating my candidate. The incoming new administration went on to hand him a key position in the Presidential Press Service.

The reason he chose to support the Opposition candidate is a story for another day. Lest I digress, the Lui I knew was a soft spoken man of a quiet disposition, but a highly dignified and respectable person.

Though highly knowledgeable and experienced, he would consult with the young editors on duty whenever he felt that a story in the news bulletin he was going to present did not make sense.

It is worth noting that most of KBC news editors, radio and TV producers who worked closely with Lui were young enough to be his children. We therefore had to learn how to respectfully deal with Lui, a man of a few words away from the microphone.

For this reason, most of us kept a respectable distance from him. For some strange reason, however, the man with a golden voice had a soft spot for me and therefore the two of us had a very good



working chemistry.

The broadcasting legend also had an intriguing and mysterious side to his personality. In fact, his real name is Samuel Warui Wang'ondu, which he coined to read Sammy Lui.

Go well my old friend. You belong to the league of extraordinary broadcasters who went before you among them Salim Mohamed, Salim Juma, Daniel Gatei and Leonard Mambo Mbotela. You have left an indelible mark in the country's broadcasting history.

Ensure safety of Kenyans who go to work abroad

The Standard exposé on how Kenyans are languishing in Russia military camps came at the right time. The Ministry of Foreign and Diaspora Affairs should perform its role of serving and promoting the legitimate interests of Kenyans living abroad. The growing number of young Kenyans being lured to travel abroad only to find themselves in trouble is alarming. While finding job opportunities for qualified Kenyans in foreign countries is welcome, the question is: Why can't our government create job opportunities locally?

Glimmer of hope for end of 43-day lecturers' strike

The 43-day lecturers' strike that has paralysed learning in public universities could be called off any time from today.

The Standard has established that the Ministry of Education and the unions representing university staff could have reached a breakthrough.

In the negotiations, the government has agreed to pay lecturers Sh7.9 billion owed to them in two tranches.

The first payment will be made in November under a supplementary budget, while the remaining balance will be cleared in July next year.

At the same time, the lecturers and government have further agreed to convene a meeting in a week to open negotiations for a new pay deal for the 2025/2029 Collective Bargaining Agreement.

The Standard has established that the University Academic Staff Union (Uasu) on Thursday evening convened a National Executive Committee — union top governance organ — to discuss the proposal.

A similar meeting of the Kenya Universities Staff Union (Kusu) has been convened.

Both unions will tomorrow convene a second meeting bringing together all their delegates to confirm the decision before the strike is called off.

Uasu Secretary General Constantine Wasonga said they met the government on Thursday and had a candid discussion.

He, however, said that after the meeting, no deal was agreed upon, even as insiders hinted at possible end to the strike.

He said the government presented its proposals, which will be presented to the National Executive Council and the national delegate conference

"We urge students to stay calm. No need to go to the streets. Allow us a few days to settle this matter. As I promised the country, this time we must get it right," said Wasonga in a phone interview with *The Standard*.

Kusu Secretary General Charles Mukhwaya said the government has shown willingness to end the strike.

"We are consulting at every level on how we can expedite the resolution of this crisis," Mukhwaya told *The Standard*.

Initially, the Ministry of Education had committed to pay Sh2.5 billion and proposed the balance be cleared in three financial years but sources within the union indicate that the offer was rejected.

Teachers query transition to SHA as Minet medical cover nears end

With just a month left before the expiry of teachers' medical cover, anxiety is growing among tutors over the silence surrounding the future of their healthcare scheme.

It has emerged that plans are at an advanced stage to migrate teachers from the Minet cover to the Social Health Authority (SHA) scheme.

But teachers are raising concerns over the secrecy surrounding the planned transition.

On Monday, Head of Public Service Felix Kosgei announced that he had received a report evaluating the planned migration to SHA's medical cover.

In a post on his official Facebook page, Kosgei said the report was prepared by a joint team drawn from SHA and the Teachers Service Commission.

"Received an update from the Joint Technical Committee of the Teachers Service Commission (TSC) and the Social Health Authority on preparations for the TSC migration to the Public Officers Medical Scheme Fund scheduled for December 1, 2025," he wrote.

Teachers' unions, however, say the process is being conducted without transparency or consultation.

Kenya National Union of Teachers (Knut) Nairobi branch Executive Secretary Macharia Mugwe said the

planned move has caused anxiety among teachers who feel left out.

"We have not had any sensitisation, no consultations. We don't even know what is in that report. TSC should have shared the report with teachers so that we can scrutinise and give our input before any transition happens," Mugwe said in an interview with *The Standard*.

He questioned the rush, warning that the move could expose teachers to an uncertain healthcare system.

"Health is not something to gamble with. It would be better if we remain with Minet and fix its challenges rather than move to a scheme we don't understand," he said.

Minet's contract expires on November 30.

Mugwe also raised concerns about SHA's capacity and structure. He questioned whether the new scheme would include benefits such as life insurance, last expense cover, and support for chronic illnesses, which teachers currently enjoy under Minet.

"What we know is that SHA does not offer life cover. We also hear that outpatient services will only be available in Level 3 hospitals. What happens to teachers who rely on private facilities?" he asked.

Similar concerns have been raised by other Knut officials in various regions. In Kericho, branch Executive Secretary David Bore urged the government to address funding delays that have previously led to poor service delivery under the Minet cover.

In Kwale County, Knut Secretary Bashir Kilalo said that despite monthly deductions from teachers' salaries, delays in remittances by TSC have left hospitals and pharmacies unpaid, forcing teachers to pay out of pocket or be denied services.

In September, TSC Acting Chief Executive Evaleen Mitei told MPs that consultations were ongoing to ensure a smooth transition.

"Consultations are ongoing to ena-

ble parties to develop the necessary framework that will ensure a smooth transition of teachers' medical care. Once the technical issues are complete, TSC will engage all stakeholders before the scheme is rolled out," Mitei told the National Assembly Education Committee.

She said teachers will be enrolled in the Public Service Medical Fund.

"It is proposed that all teachers will be onboarded to the Public Officers Medical Fund under SHA from December 1, 2025."

Death, injuries in Taveta-Kajiado border clashes

Tension is high along the border between Taita Taveta and Kajiado counties following the killing of a farmer, the injury of several others, and destruction of property.

Residents said the farmer, Emanuel Musyoka, 50, was killed in the Njukini/Elerai area in Taveta sub-county after skirmishes between two communities that have displaced more than 1,000 people.

Yesterday, Taita Taveta Governor Andrew Mwadime said the emerging clashes between the Kamba and Maasai communities were triggered by disputes over land use along the border.

The national government has deployed General Service Unit officers to defuse tension between the

two warring groups. "I stand in solidarity with those who have lost their loved ones, whose homes have been destroyed and who have been displaced. As your governor, my administration remains committed to supporting you through this difficult time," Mwadime said in a statement yesterday.

More than 70 houses were torched when members of the Maasai community descended on the disputed area armed with crude weapons and burnt down homes belonging to the Kamba.

The Maasai community claimed the Kambas had encroached on their land using a title deed—a claim the Kambas denied, saying they had lived in the disputed area for the past 50 years.

"The government has imposed a dawn-to-dusk curfew, and there is a heavy presence of police officers patrolling the volatile region, which has long been an epicentre of conflict between the Kamba, Taita, Taveta, and Maasai communities. More than 1,000 people have so far been displaced," George Mutuku, a human rights activist told *The Standard*.

Yesterday, Mwadime and his Kajiado counterpart, Joseph Ole Lenku, toured the area to restore. Mwadime and Ole Lenku said they were committed to pursuing a lasting solution that will allow border communities to coexist harmoniously.

Brief History of Nkabune Technical Training Institute

Nkabune Technical Training Institute is a Technical Institute which started way back in 1964 and is located in Imenti North constituency in Meru County. In 1967 the Ministry of Education requested the Sisters to start a grant-aided Commercial technical school for girls. This opened in 1968 at the current Gitoro Primary School, but due to lack of sufficient land for expansion the Sisters had to move the school to its present location at Nkabune on a 25 acre- piece of land donated by the local community.

In 1986, Nkabune Technical and Commercial Girls, among 18 other technical secondary schools were converted to Technical Training Institutes. The courses that were offered were Secretarial and Accounts Clerks' alongside forms three and four, which were phased out in 1987. Other courses like CPA Part one, Garment Making and Food and Beverage at Craft level were introduced in 1988.

Currently the students' enrolment is at 7017 expecting to be 7500 by January 2026, The institute comprises of 56 public Service (PS) and 63 Board of Governors (BOG) trainers and 35 support staff. The institute is registered with TVET Authority and has been accredited to offer CDACC courses at different levels. Also the institute is registered to offer NITA courses grade III, II & I

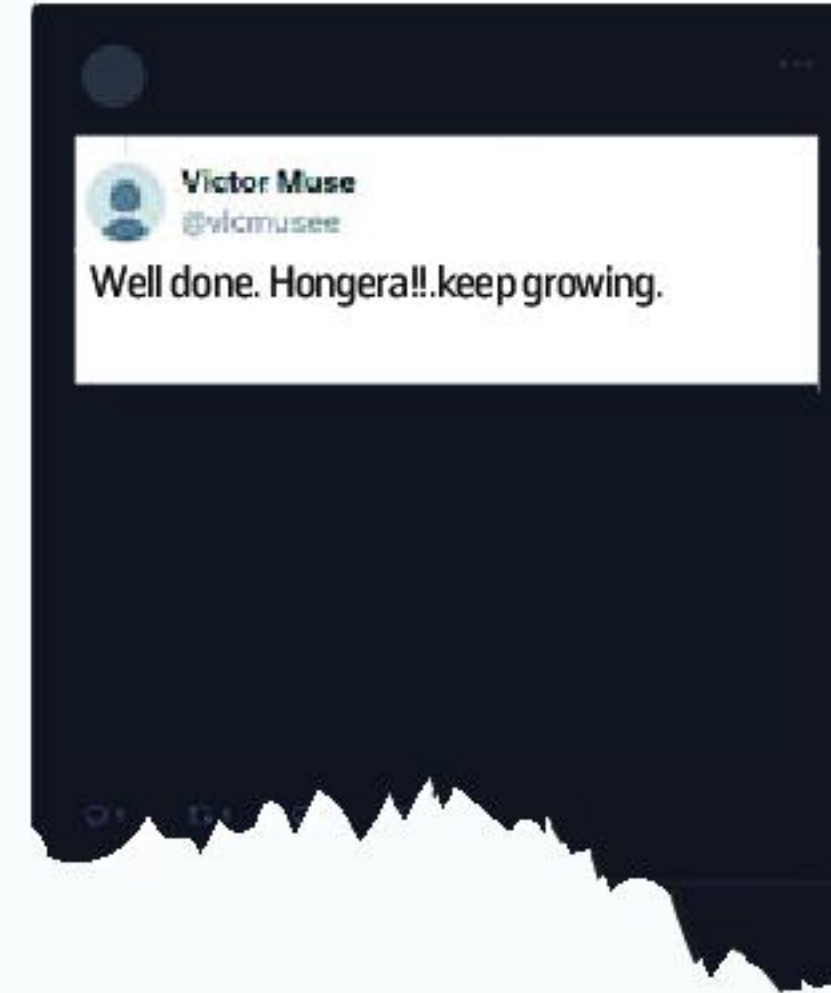
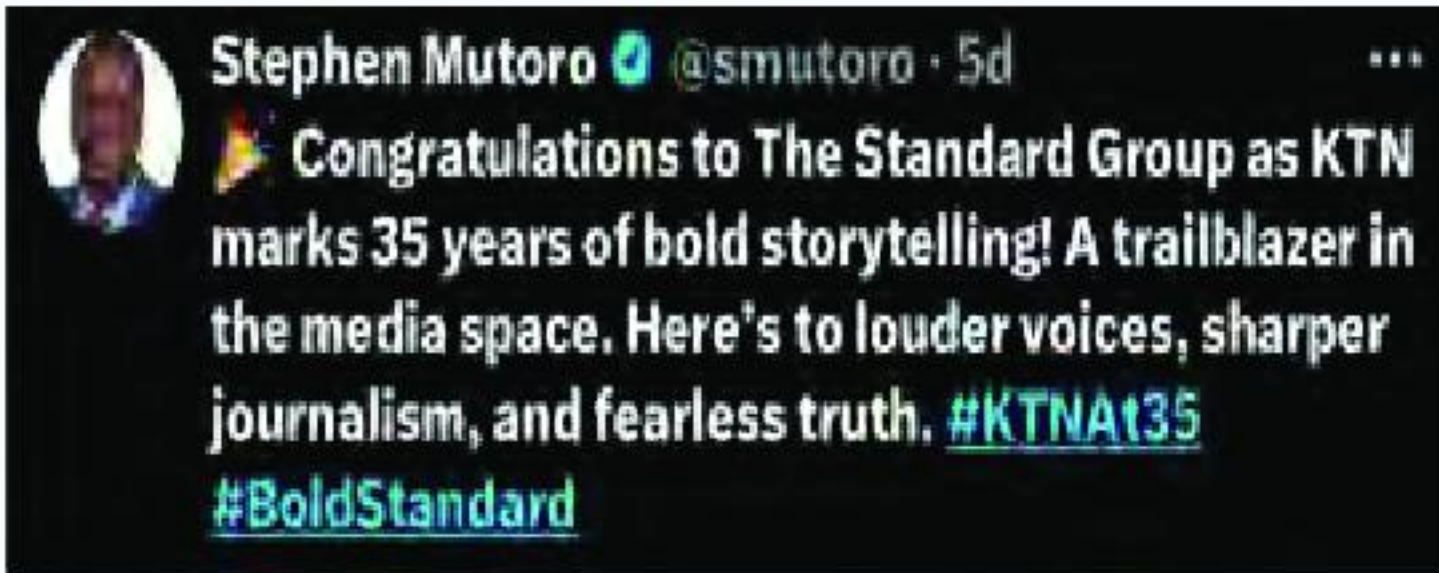

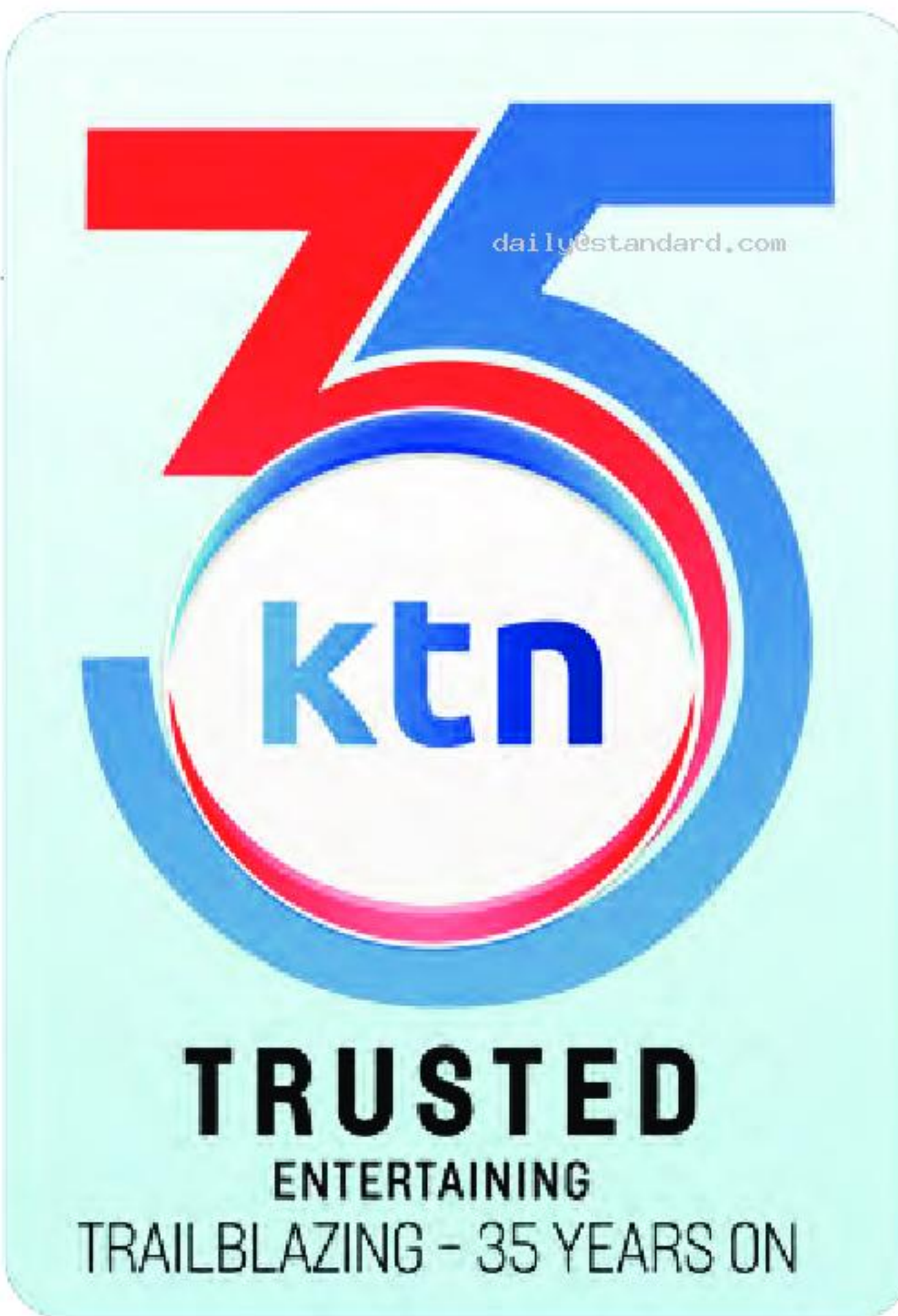

TVET reforms power skills, jobs and economic transformation

Over the last three years, the Government, through the Ministry of Education's State Department for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET), has rolled out far-reaching reforms that have transformed the sector into a key driver of Kenya's social and economic growth. These reforms align with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the country's Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA).

Under the leadership of Principal Secretary Dr. Esther Muoria, the State Department has spearheaded initiatives that are positioning TVET institutions as centres of innovation, excellence, and competitiveness, driven by technology and industry collaboration.

"We have partnered with key industry players such as Huawei to establish ICT Academies and rolled out Jitume Digital Labs to expand access to digital skills, online work, and global opportunities," says Dr. Muoria. "These initiatives empower our youth with the competencies needed to thrive in a modern economy."

To make training more flexible and accessible, the department is implementing a modularized curriculum across all TVET institutions. This approach allows learners to progressively acquire employable skills while reducing the financial burden associated with long-term training.

"Our modular approach ensures that learners can enter, exit, and re-enter the training system as their circumstances allow, acquiring relevant skills that meet market demands," Dr. Muoria explains.

Driving inclusivity and innovation

The reforms have also emphasized diversity and inclusivity within TVET institutions, ensuring equal access to training opportunities for all Kenyans, including women, persons with disabilities, and marginalized groups. This inclusiveness is critical to bridging Kenya's technical skills gap and preparing a workforce that meets the needs of a rapidly evolving economy.

According to the World Bank's recent study, global trends reinforce the importance of countries reforming their TVET systems to better align education and training with employment needs. The report, Building Better Formal TVET Systems: Principles and Practice in Low- and Middle-Income Countries, jointly prepared by the World Bank, ILO, and UNESCO, highlights the vital role of TVET in promoting employment and productivity.

The study observes that while TVET holds high potential in low- and middle-income countries, its impact has often fallen short of expectations due to challenges such as limited access, under-supported teachers, and weak institutional incentives.

"Good TVET systems help countries invest in skills and jobs for young people and benefit from the demographic dividend," the report notes. "They also equip people to navigate climate, demographic, and technological changes that are already reshaping economies."

Aligning reforms with global best practice

The report recommends that governments adopt a learner- and enterprise-centered approach, ensuring that training focuses on both technical and soft skills such as digital literacy, entrepreneurship, and problem-solving. It also encourages governments to realign financing to reward performance and innovation, while identifying "quick wins" in priority sectors that can demonstrate early success.

Kenya's TVET reforms are consistent with these global recommendations. The government has expanded industry linkages, promoted competency-based education and training (CBET), and encouraged institutions to collaborate with the private sector in curriculum development, internship placement, and resource mobilization.

These partnerships have led to the establishment of industry-aligned training centers, improved access to modern equipment, and exposure to global technologies. Through initiatives such as Jitume Digital Labs, youth are not only being trained but are also accessing global digital jobs, positioning Kenya as a growing hub for online work and innovation.

Financing and Sustainability

The World Bank report also highlights the need for increased investment in TVET. It notes that low- and middle-income countries spend less than 0.2 percent of GDP on TVET, compared to 0.46 percent in high-income countries. Mobilizing private financing, therefore, remains essential to expand training capacity and ensure sustainability.

Dr. Muoria emphasizes that partnerships between the government, industry, and development partners will continue to be central to Kenya's TVET strategy. "We are committed to ensuring that every investment in TVET yields value by producing graduates who are not only employable but also innovative and entrepreneurial," she says.

Future outlook

As global labour markets evolve due to technological advancement, climate change, and demographic shifts, Kenya's TVET sector is positioning itself to prepare youth for emerging opportunities. The modular curriculum, digital labs, and strong industry partnerships are ensuring that TVET graduates can adapt to the changing world of work.

The World Bank report concludes that well-performing TVET systems produce graduates who possess the right skills for today's jobs and the agility to adjust to tomorrow's needs. "Strong TVET systems are essential for achieving the Sustainable Development Goals by efficiently supporting employment, productivity, and economic resilience."

For Kenya, this vision is already taking shape. Through its bold reforms, strategic partnerships, and commitment to inclusivity, the TVET sector is emerging as a cornerstone of the country's long-term development, equipping young people with the skills and confidence to power Kenya's transformation into a globally competitive, knowledge-driven economy.

Subsidiaries push Equity third quarter profit to Sh52.1 billion

▶ While the bank's earnings rose sharply, almost half of it came from its outside operations.

▶ Lender's diversification bearing fruit as technology and insurance increased their revenue contribution.

Kenya's largest bank by customers Equity Group has reported a 32.66 per cent surge in its third-quarter net profit, which climbed from Sh39.2 billion in the previous year to Sh52.1 billion, powered predominantly by its thriving regional subsidiaries.

The performance, which offers a ray of hope for the broader financial sector and the larger Kenyan economy amid a corporate slowdown marked by losses in key sectors, was anchored on a 10 per cent growth in total operating income, which rose from Sh141.7 billion to Sh156.2 billion. This was driven by a 16 per cent jump in net interest income to Sh93.5 billion and a three per cent rise in non-funded income to Sh62.6 billion.

Yesterday, the Equity Group chief executive James Mwangi said the performance marked a successful culmination of the lender's five-year transformational shift from a Kenyan-focused bank to a pan-regional financial group.

He disclosed that 49 per cent of the group's

banking revenue came from outside Kenya.

Alongside Kenya, these subsidiaries operate in Uganda, Tanzania, Rwanda, South Sudan, and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC).

In an effort to mitigate the impact of the economic slowdown in Kenya, local banks including Equity have been actively expanding into foreign markets in East and Central Africa.

"The race has been won, the subsidiaries in the region are bigger than Kenya," Mwangi said during a briefing with investors in Nairobi yesterday.

"We are no longer a Kenyan bank, we are a regional bank. We have more business outside Kenya than we have in Kenya."

This strategic expansion has effectively insulated Equity Group from headwinds in the local market.

Analysts say as the first major lender to release third-quarter results, Equity's strong per-

formance, fuelled by its regional strategy, sets a positive tone for the local banking sector that is confronting economic slowdown and a crisis of non performing loans.

Mwangi painted a stark picture of the financial challenges in Kenya, where customer appetite for loans has waned.

"The balance sheet in Kenya is not growing. This reflects the market," he explained.

"The market is going through a very difficult environment, customers are not borrowing, our loans are going down, deposits are not significantly growing. It's a flat, declining balance sheet."

He noted that while Equity's lending in Kenya stands at Sh400 billion, the bank is holding an additional Sh600 billion in cash, a ready war chest for when the market recovers.

"I want to appeal to Kenyans that we understand the environment. But the most striking thing is despite that challenge, Kenya is improving the quality of its loan book," Mwangi added. The regional subsidiaries helped lift Equity's overall performance.

In the DRC, profit after tax grew by 21 per cent to Sh13.8 billion while in Tanzania, profit after tax nearly doubled, soaring by 88 per cent to Sh1.5 billion. The local subsidiary, Equity Bank Kenya, equally posted a 51 per cent growth in profit after tax to Sh31.1 billion, defying the economic tough climate. Mwangi said the group's diversification into non-banking businesses is also bearing fruit.

The Nairobi Coffee Exchange (NCE) generated Sh 411.8 million after the auction of 7,135 bags of coffee during the weekly market. The market fetched less compared to Sh 565.4 million of last week after the sale of 8,674 bags of coffee.

In the auction, 10 coffee brokers participated, offering 1,069 bags of grade AA and 1,989 bags of grade AB.

In the auction, factories allied to the Alliance Berries Limited and New KPCU achieved the highest price while Nyeri-based Kiamariga achieved the highest price of Sh61,436, for the grade AA marketed by Alliance Berries Limited, followed by Kabunyaeria who netted Sh60,853 and Lucas Estate that earned Sh60,336.

Others are Menu Estate (Sh59,173) and Kapchepoi Factory (Sh59,819).

Kenyans grapple with stagnation, decline in earnings

Most Kenyans reported a stagnation or decline in their earnings over the quarter to September compared to a similar period last year, pointing to the difficulties that they continue to grapple with. Worst hit were people employed in the informal sector, where the survey noted incomes were generally on a decline as the sector reduced hiring. This is even as their counterparts in the formal economy, whose incomes have been slashed by recent high taxes, got creative and shored up their earnings through side hustles which, according to a new survey, cushioned some of them from the general decline and stagnation in income. The ICEA Lion Asset Management's Consumer Spending Index noted that half of respondents indicated that their income remained flat between July and September 2025 compared to the same quarter in 2024. This was the highest level of stagnant income growth recorded this year. "Most of the income decreases were noted among people working in the informal sector," said ICEA Lion Asset Management chief executive Einstein Kihanda.

"Increased incomes were noted among self employed or employees of organisations. The main reasons attributed to increased incomes were side hustles, which is taking up income sources outside the normal jobs that people hold." The survey also noted that upper middle class and high income segments had the largest proportion of respondents recording better incomes over the past year. The low income segment, however, had most individuals indicating that their income was lower in the third quarter of 2025 compared to a similar period in 2024.

There were also signs of improvement in the economy as survey respondents said they were able to buy more household items over the quarter to September using the same amount of money compared to a similar period last year.

This is on account of easing inflation as well as relative increase in liquidity as banks resumed lending to businesses and households. "Approximately 87 per cent of consumers indicated that they had spent higher than they spent in the previous quarter."

"We note that the bulk of increased spending was attributed to purchase of additional items rather than higher prices of goods, which is a good sign," said Kihanda. Eldoret and Nakuru had the highest proportion of respondents who said their income had gone up.

The opposite was true in Kisumu, which the survey notes had the highest proportion of respondents saying their incomes had declined over the last 12 months.

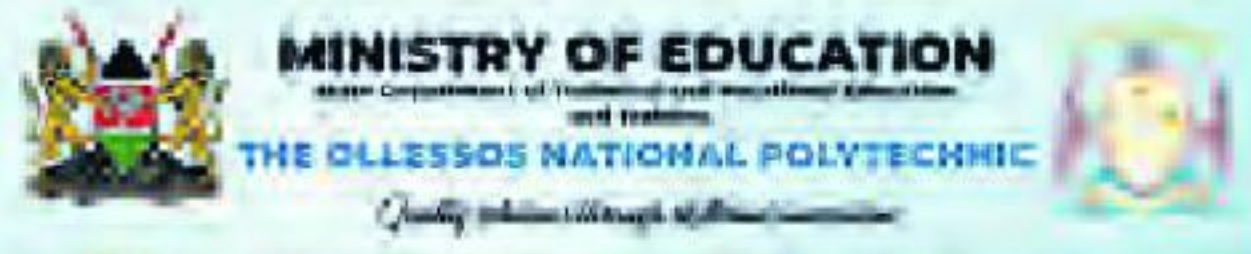

Trump and Xi seal surprise trade ceasefire after six years of silence

▶ Leaders agree to roll back tariffs and secure rare earth supplies in bid to calm global markets.

▶ China pledges to boost US farm imports and curb fentanyl flow as both sides hail 'great success'.

Donald Trump and Xi Jinping agreed on Thursday to calm the trade war between China and the United States that has roiled global markets, with Washington cutting some tariffs and Beijing committing to keep supplies of critical rare earths flowing.

Trump called his first meeting with Xi in six years a "great success", while the Chinese leader said the two reached an "important consensus" towards solving the fight between the world's two top economies.

"I thought it was an amazing meeting," Trump said after the talks in Busan, South Korea, praising Xi as a "tremendous leader of a very powerful country" and saying he would visit China in April.

Trump added that the deal included China immediately buying "tremendous amounts of soybeans and other farm products", a key issue for Trump's support in farm country and a point of leverage for Beijing.

The US leader said the talks yielded an extendable one-year deal on China's supply of crucial rare earths, materials that are essential for sophisticated electronic components across a range of industries.

Beijing's commerce ministry also confirmed it would suspend for one

year certain export restrictions, including on rare earth materials, a sector where China is hugely dominant.

"All the rare earths has been settled, and that's for the world," Trump told reporters aboard Air Force One.

Xi said a "consensus" had been reached and urged "follow-up work as soon as possible".

Trump added that the Chinese leader had also agreed to "work very hard to stop the flow" of deadly opioid fentanyl, a trade in which Washington has accused Beijing of being complicit.

"I put a 20-percent tariff on China because of the fentanyl coming in... and based on his statements today I am going to reduce that by 10 percent," Trump said.

And in social media post after leaving South Korea, Trump declared "Our Farmers will be very happy!" with the outcomes of the talks.

The former reality TV star went on to say in the post that Beijing would "begin the process of purchasing American Energy", potentially involving oil and gas from Alaska.

Officials from the United States and China would meet to hash out that "energy deal", he added.

Neither leader made any public comments immediately after the talks, which lasted around an hour and 40 minutes.

Trump headed straight to Air Force One, waving and pumping his fist as he boarded the plane. The jet took off minutes later.

Xi was seen getting into his limousine outside the closed-door meeting.

Xi acknowledged before the meeting began in earnest that both sides did not always see eye to eye, but should strive to be "partners and friends".

"China and the US can jointly shoulder our responsibility as major countries and work together to accomplish more great and concrete things for the good of our two countries and the whole world," said Xi.

Sitting opposite each other, each leader was flanked by senior officials including Secretary of State Marco Rubio, Treasury chief Scott Bessent and Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick.

Caribbean reels from 'unprecedented' hurricane destruction

Hurricane Melissa was moving towards Bermuda on Thursday after ripping a path of destruction through the Caribbean that left at least 20 people dead in Haiti, and parts of Jamaica and Cuba in ruins.

The Bahamas government discontinued a hurricane warning for its central and southeastern regions, the National Hurricane Center (NHC) said in its latest advisory early Thursday.

"Follow advice of local officials as you may need to remain sheltered after the storm due to downed power lines and flooding," the NHC warned.

Flooding is expected to subside in the Bahamas later on Thursday, although it could persist in Cuba, Jamaica, Haiti and the Dominican Republic, the US weather bureau added.

The storm was still 1,105 kilometers southwest of Bermuda as of 5:00 am US Eastern time (0900 GMT), according to the NHC.

"Hurricane Melissa is expected to pass Bermuda as a Category 1 Hurricane. While not a direct hit, the system will pass close enough to warrant precautionary safety measures," the Bermuda government posted on social media.

After Melissa left Cuban shores, residents

started assessing their losses, with President Miguel Diaz-Canel describing the damage as "extensive."

In the east of the communist island, which is battling its worst economic crisis in decades, people struggled through flooded and collapsed homes and inundated streets.

The storm smashed windows, downed power cables and mobile communications, and ripped off roofs and tree branches. Cuban authorities said about 735,000 people had been evacuated -- mainly in the provinces of Santiago de Cuba, Holguin and Guantanamo. [AFP]

BRAZIL. LULA 'HORRIFIED' BY DEATH TOLL IN RIO RAIDS

■ Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva is "horrified" by the death toll from a massive police raid on Rio drug gangs, which left scores dead, one of his ministers said on Wednesday. "The president is horrified by the number of fatal incidents and was surprised that an operation of this scale was set up without the knowledge of the federal government," Justice Minister Ricardo Lewandowski said of the raid on Tuesday. The Rio de Janeiro state public defender's office said earlier at least 132 people were killed in the deadliest police operation in Rio's history. State police in their latest update reported that 119 people had been killed, including 115 "narcoterrorists" and four officers. [AFP]

ISRAEL. ULTRA-ORTHODOX JEWS PROTEST CONSCRIPTION

■ Thousands of ultra-Orthodox Jewish men, dressed in black, rallied in Jerusalem on Thursday to protest against military conscription, an issue that has caused major strain in Israel's right-wing ruling coalition. The vast crowd were protesting against the absence of a law guaranteeing their right to avoid Israel's mandatory military service—a pledge long promised by Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. Crowds of men, many wearing black hats, set fire to pieces of tarpaulin as hundreds of police officers cordoned off several roads across the city, AFP correspondents reported. Carrying placards denouncing conscription, demonstrators marched along main roads leading into Jerusalem. The mass demonstration follows a recent crackdown on ultra-Orthodox draft dodgers, with thousands of call-up notices sent in recent months and several deserters imprisoned. [AFP]

PARIS

France arrests suspects over Sh13b Louvre heist

French police have arrested five more people, including a prime suspect, over this month's daring Louvre museum robbery, the Paris prosecutor said on Thursday.

Dozens of detectives have been hunting for four thieves who used a truck with a moving lift and cutting gear to break into a first-floor gallery at the museum on October 19, fleeing with jewellery worth an estimated \$102 million (Sh13 billion).

The latest arrests come after two suspects were charged on Wednesday with theft and criminal conspiracy. They are suspected of being the two who broke into the gallery while two accomplices waited outside.

Paris prosecutor Laure Beccau said the five suspects detained on Wednesday included a main suspect whose DNA linked him to the brazen seven-minute heist, though none of the loot had been found.

"We had him in our sights," she said.

"As for the other individuals who are in police custody, they are people who may be able to provide us with information about the course of events."

She said it was "too early" to give

additional details about the suspects.

The five detentions took place in and around Paris, particularly in Seine-Saint-Denis, a region just outside the French capital.

Two suspects detained on Saturday were charged on Wednesday evening with theft and criminal conspiracy after they "partially admitted to the charges", according to prosecutors.

They were placed in pre-trial detention.

One is a 34-year-old Algerian living in France, who was identified by DNA traces found on one of the scooters used to flee the heist.

The second suspect is a 39-year-old unlicensed taxi driver from the Paris suburb of Aubervilliers.

Both were known to the police for having committed thefts.

The first was arrested as he was about to board a plane for Algeria at Paris Charles de Gaulle airport.

The second was apprehended shortly after near his home, and "there is no evidence to suggest that he was planning to go abroad", the prosecutor said. Last week, Beccau told media that detectives were investigating "150 DNA samples, fingerprints and other traces". [AFP]

Trump directs nuclear weapons testing to resume for first time in over 30 years

US President Donald Trump said Thursday he had ordered the Pentagon to start nuclear weapons testing "on an equal basis" to China and Russia -- an announcement made just minutes before he held a high-stakes summit with Chinese leader Xi Jinping.

The move came after Russian President Vladimir Putin said on Wednesday that Moscow had successfully tested a nuclear-capable, nuclear-powered underwater drone, in defiance of Washington's warnings.

"Because of other countries testing programs, I have instructed the

Department of War to start testing our Nuclear Weapons on an equal basis," Trump wrote in a social media post.

Following that announcement, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters on Thursday that the weapon tests announced by Putin did not constitute a direct test of an atomic weapon.

Both countries observe a de facto moratorium on testing nuclear warheads, though Russia regularly runs military drills involving systems that are capable of carrying such weapons. [AFP]

Survivors speak of 'hell on earth' as Sudan bleeds

▶ United Nations warns of fresh atrocities as 36,000 flee Darfur stronghold.

▶ Survivors recount killings, looting and bodies left in the streets.

Families hid in trenches, bodies lay in the streets and children were killed in front of their parents as Sudanese paramilitaries advanced into the western city of El-Fasher, survivors told AFP.

More than 36,000 civilians have fled the city since Sunday, when the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) captured the army's last stronghold in the Darfur region, triggering warnings from the UN and humanitarian groups of possible mass killings and ethnic cleansing.

Some have sought refuge in Tawila, a town around 70 kilometres to the west that is already sheltering some 650,000 displaced people.

In satellite phone interviews with AFP, three survivors who reached Tawila described scenes of terror and loss during their escape from a city besieged by the RSF for 18 months, cut off from food, medicine and other aid.

Their accounts echoed those of survivors of the mass killings in Darfur in the early 2000s, when Janjaweed militias—the forces accused of genocide there which later became the RSF—burned villages, killed some 300,000 people and displaced 2.7 million more.

Emtithal Mahmoud, a survivor of the earlier Darfur killings now based in the United States, recounted to AFP a harrowing moment when she recognised her cousin, Nadifa, in a video shared by RSF accounts, lying dead on the ground.

The survivors' full names have been withheld for their safety.

• **Hayat, mother of five: 'They killed my 16-year-old son'**

"On Saturday at 6 am, the shelling was extremely heavy. I took my children and hid with them in a trench. We haven't heard from my husband for six months.

"After about an hour, seven RSF fighters entered our house. They took my phone, searched even my undergarments, and killed my 16-year-old son. We fled with many people from our neighborhood.

"On the road between El-Fasher and Garni (a village northwest of the city), we saw many dead bodies lying on the ground and wounded people left behind in the open because their families couldn't carry them. Along

the way, we were robbed again and the young men travelling with us were stopped. We don't know what happened to them."

• **Hussein, survivor wounded by shelling: 'Bodies in the streets'**

"We left El-Fasher early Saturday morning. The road was exhausting—hunger, thirst and constant checkpoints. Before Garni, we were stopped for three hours. They said I must have been fighting because I was injured. If it wasn't for a family passing by with a donkey cart carrying their mother, I wouldn't have reached Garni. They helped me get there.

"The situation in El-Fasher is so terrible—dead bodies in the streets, and no one to bury them. We're grateful we made it here, even if we only have the clothes we were wearing. Here, we finally feel some safety. I went to the clinic and they checked my leg."

• **Mohamed, father of four: Corpses 'turned to bones'**

"I used to live in the Zamzam camp (for displaced people). When the RSF entered the camp, I fled to El-Fasher and stayed in the Abu Shouk neighborhood. The fighting on Saturday was extremely heavy—my four daughters, their mother and I spent the entire day hiding in

a trench until dawn on Sunday.

"We left before sunrise and walked toward Garni. On the way, they robbed me of my money and stopped the young men to take them. I saw dead bodies, some already turned to bones.

"They beat me on my back with sticks, and I already had shrapnel in my leg from a shell that fell near our home in Zamzam.

"We reached Tawila at sunset on Tuesday. Now, we have nowhere to stay. My daughters, their mother and I are sleeping in the open without any covers. Aid workers gave us some food, but no tents or blankets.

"We just want the war to end so we can go back to our homes."

• **US-based Emtithal Mahmoud, 32: 'Recognised my cousin from a video'**

"It is almost impossible to describe the feeling that we're feeling right now as people from Darfur. A lot of our family members are still trapped in the city. We don't know who's dead or alive.

"We have videos and reports of people being killed. It's so terrible because even in the videos that the RSF is sharing, gloating as they commit a continuation of the genocide since the early 2000s, we're recognising our family members and friends. We found out that one of our cousins was killed because of a video that was circulating.

"In the video circulated by her killers, the RSF, you can see her corpse on the ground. And you can hear the RSF person saying, 'Get up if you can.' And so they're taunting her corpse and it's another form of torture.

"She was a volunteer for quite some time and when the siege happened she joined the resistance. She's one of the women warriors."

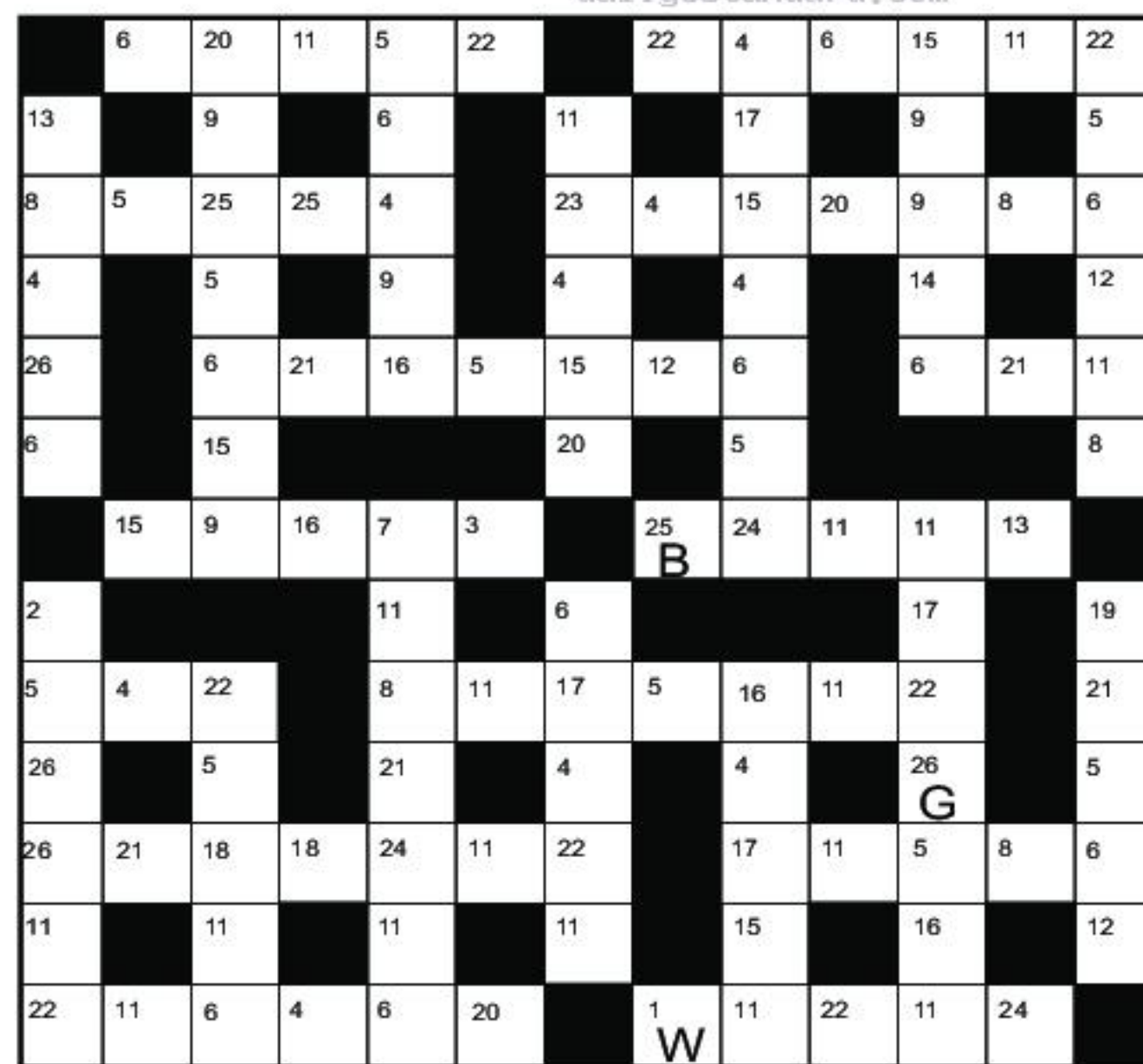

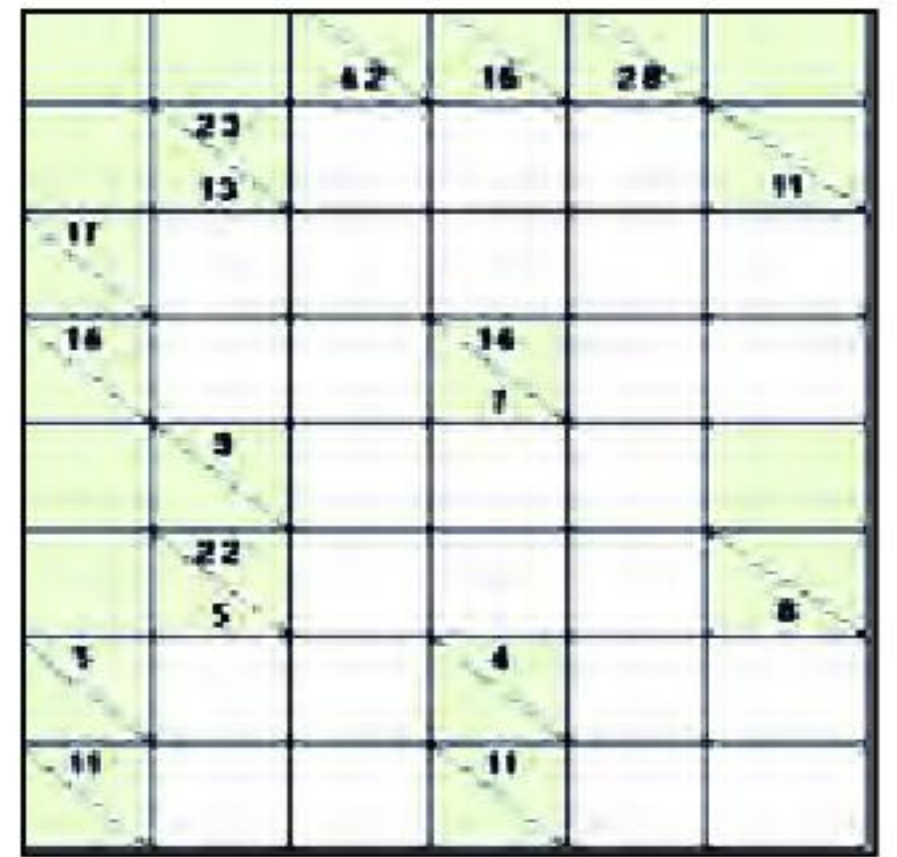

Water for peace: Kenya's new policy links natural resource management to conflict prevention

In Kenya's arid north, where rivers run dry and clouds often pass without promise, the competition for water has long been a silent driver of tension.

Kenya has officially unveiled a new policy framework that directly links natural resource planning, particularly water management, to peacebuilding and conflict prevention.

This emerged during the International Conference on Water, Peace and Security, where policymakers, researchers, and global leaders converged to discuss how environmental governance can become an instrument of peace.

At the center of Kenya's approach is a recognition that environmental stresses, drought, resource scarcity, degraded landscapes are not just ecological challenges; they are also political, social, and security risks that demand coordinated solutions.

"We are integrating conflict-sensitive approaches to natural resource management, and this is Kenya's new peacebuilding architecture that now guides our national policy on peacebuilding and conflict management," said Dr. Raymond Omollo, the Principal Secretary for Internal Security and National Administration.

"It means that within the water sector, we deliberately assess and mitigate the potential for resource competition to spark disputes by involving all stakeholders."

Dr. Omollo outlined five key initiatives that are transforming the country's policy into practice.

The first is the National Climate Change Security Response Program, a cross-ministerial effort led by the Ministry of Interior that seeks to address the root causes of environmental and resource-based conflicts such as drought, food insecurity, and water scarcity.

He pointed to Kenya's unique grassroots model the Chiefs' Climate Action Day as a practical example of community-led environmental peacebuilding.

"Every first Friday of the month, chiefs across the country mobilize their communities to plant trees and restore degraded landscapes," said Dr. Omollo.

The initiative, he added, is not just about greening the land but about rebuilding social cohesion. "When communities plant trees together, they rebuild trust and hope together," he said.

Kenya's policy also places technology and information at the heart of peacebuilding. Through improved data integration, the government is combining information on water availability,



weather forecasts, and land use to strengthen conflict early-warning systems.

By integrating data into our conflict early warning models, authorities and local peace committees can anticipate and de-escalate potential water-related conflicts before tensions actually turn violent.

Water security is now a shared national priority.

He cited examples where climate forecasts have been used to predict grazing shortfalls in pastoral areas, triggering early dialogue between herding communities to prevent clashes.

The PS also emphasized growing cross-sector collaboration among ministries responsible for water, environment, agriculture, and security.

"Water security is now a shared national priority," he said.

The Water Police Unit, once mainly tasked with protecting urban water infrastructure, has been retooled to safeguard new dam projects and community water schemes. These developments, Omollo said, are essential to ensuring equitable water access and long-term stability.

"He noted that sustainable water infrastructure is the backbone of our peace architecture. When protected livelihood is protected and when livelihoods are secure, peace is sustainable."

Kenya's approach also extends beyond its borders. The country continues to champion transboundary water cooperation through frameworks such as the Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD) and the Nile Basin Initiative.

"Local communities on both sides of Lake Turkana, which we share with Ethiopia, are now engaged in joint peace dialogues and resource management projects, acknowledging ultimately one ecosystem shared.

Kenya's cooperation model, he added, seeks to make shared waters bridges of peace, not barriers of division.

"Our guiding principle is that water is not merely a resource, it is life itself. It is the foundation of our security, our stability, and above all, our survival," Omollo said.

Dr. Omollo reiterated that the Horn of Africa has lived the realities the conference seeks to address.

From the Karamoja Cluster on the Kenya-Uganda border, where cross-border water points have sparked recurring pastoral conflict, to disputes over fishing zones in South Sudan, water scarcity has too often been a trigger for violence.

Across the continent, he said, similar patterns are visible.

"Disruptions to fisheries, farming, and pastoralism around Lake Chad have strained inter-community relations, illustrating how water insecurity can exacerbate broader instability," he said.

Dr. Omollo emphasized that peacebuilding cannot be imposed from above; it must be cultivated from below.

That's why Kenya's approach empowers local actors, especially chiefs, peace committees, and women's groups, to lead water dialogue and management.

"We are strengthening community-based security and early-warning systems. Local peace committees are being trained to resolve disputes over water sources through negotiation rather than violence," he explained.

He also called for deeper regional learning and joint research, noting that Kenya's policy could serve as a model for other countries

navigating water-related security challenges.

Despite the progress, Dr. Omollo acknowledged that challenges remain.

"There is often a gap between our robust policies and the reality on the ground. We need better implementation, more resources at the community level, and improved translation of early warning into rapid response," he said.

He urged continued investment in regional diplomacy, acknowledging that building consensus on shared waters is painstaking work. "Sustainable water security is impossible without peace, and durable peace cannot exist without water security," he said.

Delegates reflected on the emerging consensus: managing water wisely is one of the surest paths to securing peace.

The PS said Kenya's evolving model blending environmental restoration, data-driven decision-making, community action, and regional diplomacy illustrates how countries can weave environmental governance into the fabric of national security.

"Let us ensure that every child, every farmer, every herder, every mother in Kenya, across Africa, and around the world can look to water not as a source of fear, but as a foundation for peace," Dr. Omollo

said.

"If we succeed in this, we will have transformed one of our greatest challenges into one of our greatest opportunities."

Former Ghanaian President Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo-Addo, who also addressed the conference, echoed similar sentiments, warning that Africa's peace and prosperity hinge on how well the continent manages its water resources.

"Across Africa, water has become one of the defining tests of our governance, our resilience, and our shared humanity," he said.

"Water insecurity, once a silent challenge, has become one of the greatest tests of our generation. Across our continent, the warning signs are unmistakable rivers that once bound communities now divide them."

Drawing parallels from the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD) dispute between Ethiopia and Egypt, Nana Akufo-Addo urged African leaders to prioritize dialogue over division.

"The construction of the GERD has brought longstanding sensitivities to the surface between Ethiopia and Egypt. There is a need to choose cooperation over confrontation. Proper dialogue towards an amicable resolution can reap immense benefits for all involved," he noted.

Teen sensation Jacinta Njeri shatters glass ceiling in golf

► She is set to make history as the first-ever Kenyan lady golfer at Tokyo Deaflympics Games.

► The Form Two student at Ngala Secondary School for the Deaf has promised to return home with gold from Tokyo.

New kid on the block and Kenya teen golf sensation Jacinta Njeri is hopeful to carry on with her meteoric performances on the golf courses that have seen her punch a ticket to the 25th edition of the Deaflympics Summer Games set for Tokyo, Japan, on November 15-26.

The Form Two student at Ngala Secondary School for the Deaf in Nakuru County is already inspired ahead of the global showpiece where she will represent Kenya alongside the experienced trio of Deaflympics golf bronze medallist Isaac Makokha, Gilbert Alikula, and Adan Wario.

"I'm excited to be part of Team Kenya, it is even more historic to be the only and first Kenyan lady golfer in the Games, so I'm determined to put my best foot forward to return home with a medal, preferably gold," the 19-year-old hard hitter told *Standard Sports* at her Vet Lab Sports Club training base in Kabete.

The historic moment has seen Njeri call upon other ladies to embrace the sport, stating that she doesn't want to be the only lady golfer high up there hanging with the men.

"I'm challenging more deaf women to embrace the sport, it will not only inspire them but will also make them more empowered in decision-making," she underlined.

Njeri is grateful for the mentorship she is getting from her other three compatriots, especially from the decorated Makokha, who is currently ranked third globally in the discipline.

"Through Makokha's mentorship, I feel motivated to perform

well in Tokyo. I have a feeling that I'll medal in the Games," she said.

Among the areas that the handicap 20 hard hitter is tightening in her training sessions that alternate on several golf courses dotting the capital city, including Railways, Golf Park, Muthaiga and Vet Lab, are her swings, putts and chips.

"I do lots of practice on the fairways and on the range, where I hit countless balls to perfect my tees and swings, but I don't go to the gym. As for diet, I eat lots of meat and protein. I also drink lots of juices and water to stay rehydrated," she highlighted.

Njeri, who has bagged several accolades in championships in

Nairobi, Eldoret, Kitale and Nakuru, is forever grateful to her coach and Vet Lab Sports Club resident pro Shem Orwenyo for introducing her to the 'gentleman's' game three years ago.

"Through this sport, I have become a better person. I have made amazing friends, I have improved my socialisation skills, I have won great prizes from competitions, and I also play the game to manage stress," she said.

Her greatest challenge in the sport is communication, which she stressed is a big barrier, especially when competing against hearing participants.

Njeri's ultimate dream in the

discipline is to be both Olympic and World champion, and due to her age, she believes she has enough time to work towards that objective.

Makokha, Alikula and Wario represented Kenya in the last edition of the Deaflympics held in Caxias Do Sul in Brazil in 2022, where Makokha stole the show by winning for Kenya the historic bronze medal.

Njeri says the experienced trio have really helped her to sharpen her claws ahead of Tokyo through intense mentorship.

Owing to the rigorous training and the experience she has gained from various tournaments, Njeri, who also plays volleyball and basketball in her free time, has declared her readiness for the Tokyo challenge.

"I'm well prepared for the task ahead. My family too are behind me, they are inspiring and motivating me to leave no stone unturned in my preparations. All that I can promise them is that I'll do my best to return home with a prize," she said.

Team Kenya deaf golf coach David Kihara has praised Njeri for her dedication and potential in the sport, tipping her to medal in Tokyo.

"When I saw her swing and looked at her scoring records, I noted that her potential is very high. She is young, she is strong, she is committed," Kihara highlighted.

"She is willing to pay the price to be a Deaflympics medallist. The girl has the potential to be a great player in the future, so I urge her to make the best use of the opportunities that come her way well," added Kihara who has also tipped the Kenya golf team for good performance in Tokyo.

"I believe we are ready for it (Deaflympics). Some medals are coming," Kihara declared.

Jannik Sinner cruises in Paris Masters opener

Jannik Sinner began his tilt at a maiden Paris Masters crown which would return him to world number one with a 6-4, 6-2 win over Zizou Bergs on Wednesday, while reigning champion Alexander Zverev battled through a lengthy three-setter.

Following the surprise exit of world number one Carlos Alcaraz at the round of 32 stage on Tuesday, a maiden crown in the ATP 1000 event in the French capital would return Sinner to the summit of the world rankings.

But the Italian second seed showed no signs of feeling the weight of that pressure in his opening match at La Defense Arena -- the top eight seeds received byes through the first round.

"I'm very happy to come through the first match," Sinner said.

"I was very precise, and I also started off with a break straight away, which gives you a bit more confidence."

Four-time Grand Slam champion Sinner is known for his efficiency on-court and won through against 41st-ranked Belgian Bergs in one hour and 27 minutes without facing a single break point.

The 24-year-old methodically engineered breaks of his own early in both sets to seal his spot in the third round, where he will meet Francisco Cerundolo on Thursday.

Germany's Zverev battled past Argentine world number 49 Camilo Ugo Carabelli 6-7 (5/7), 6-1, 7-5 to open his title defence.

He will next take on Spanish 15th seed Alejandro Davidovich Fokina following his victory over Frenchman Arthur Cazaux.

A hardfought tie-break separated Zverev and Ugo Carabelli in the opening set, before the 28-year-old cruised through the second in 35 minutes.

It then seemed Zverev might follow Alcaraz in crashing out early at La Defense Arena when the third seed fell 1-3 behind in the decider.

But he hit back instantly on his opponent's next service game, before securing the crucial break at 5-5 to keep his title defence alive. [AFP]

Dallas Mavericks' Williams apologises for marijuana arrest

Dallas Mavericks guard Brandon Williams has apologised for "being a distraction" after he was arrested on a charge of marijuana possession at Dallas Fort Worth Airport on Saturday.

Williams missed two Dallas games after less than two ounces of marijuana, which is illegal for recreational use in the state of Texas, were found in his luggage.

The 25-year-old scored 20 points and seven rebounds from the bench when he returned in the Mavericks' 107-105 win against the Indiana Pacers at American Airlines Centre.

"I can't really go into further detail," Williams said.

"I just want to apologise for just being a

distraction. I want to take full accountability."

The use of marijuana is not prohibited in the NBA and the league stopped testing for the substance in 2023. The Mavericks are 12th in the Western Conference and have won two of their five games this season.

Elsewhere, Matas Buzelis scored 27 points while Josh Giddey and Nikola Vucevic both chipped in with double-doubles to extend the Chicago Bulls' perfect start to the season.

The Bulls have won all four of their games and sit top of the Eastern Conference after beating the Sacramento Kings 126-113 in Chicago. Austin Reaves scored on the buzzer to lead the Los Angeles Lakers to a 116-115

win against the Minnesota Timberwolves in Minneapolis.

Reaves ended the game with 28 points and 16 assists to make up for the absence of injured Lakers stars LeBron James and Luka Doncic.

Ja Morant's 28 points for the Memphis Grizzlies in Arizona consigned the Phoenix Suns to a fourth successive loss.

The Portland Trail Blazers profited from Jrue Holiday's four key free throws in the final seconds to earn a 136-134 win over the Utah Jazz in Salt Lake City.

The New Orleans Pelicans remain the only side in the Western Conference yet to win after losing 122-88 at the Denver Nuggets. [AFP]

Before athletics enthusiasts shift their attention to the New York City Marathon on Sunday, a team of six men will have attempted a 42.195km relay world record in Paris.

The squad of John Lomoni, Amos Kipkemoi, Meshack Legut, Brian Kibor, Ezra Ondiso and Elisha Kiprop are plotting to smash a 20-year-old world record at the Ekiden de Paris marathon relay.

Lomoni and compatriots have set their sights on demolishing a 20-year-old 1:57:06 world record set in Japan by a Kenyan battalion of Daniel Mwangi, Mekubo Mogosu, Onesmus Nyerere and John Kariuki in 2005.

At the Ekiden de Paris relay contest, the six athletes will be running different distances which are 5km, 10km and 7.195km.

On Sunday, the men will change the

batons in a 5-10-5-10-5-7.195km format in the contest that started in Japan in 1917 before shifting to Paris in 2013.

The marathon relay record was set in November 2005 when a team member like Lomoni was a ten-month-old baby.

At last weekend's national cross country, his main focus, he said, was to confirm whether his fitness was well tuned ahead of next Sunday's marathon relay world record attempt.

"We will be aiming at 1 hour 56 minutes and we understand the nature of the assignment. The training in Iten has been good and we are ready to make history at the Ekiden de Paris," said Lomoni.

Alongside Amos Kipkemoi, Meshack Legut, Brian Kibor, Ezra Ondiso and Elisha Kiprop, Lomoni will be looking to edge his name in the history books.

Team coach Byron Kipchumba said the squad will today have a feel of the marathon relay course.

Organisers say the first five marathon relay runners will change batons in 5km or 10km distances, while the anchor will complete the remaining 7.195km.

Lomoni, who finished ninth at the national cross country championships staged at the Eldoret Sports Club grounds on Saturday, said he is ready for the Paris assignment.

The 20-year-old athlete used the national cross country event to test his endurance and speed ahead of the Sunday marathon relay.

A total of 1,630 teams, comprising 9,327 runners, are registered for the six-person relay marathon held in the streets of Paris and organised by the French Athletics Federation, organisers said.

Participants will be passing through iconic buildings, starting with the Eiffel Tower, next to which the start and finish lines are located.

"We are committed to offering one-off events dedicated to all participants, of all ages and levels, but also a whole range of activities that they can find in our clubs on a daily basis," Emmanuelle Jaeger, Vice-President of the French Athletics Federation recently said.

Arsenal are enjoying an excellent start to the season -

affecting Arsenal, with a number of supporters from traditional 'big six' clubs regularly posting on social media about how the lack of atmosphere at home matches can be disappointing.

For Arsenal, there are reasons why there may be a perceived drop in atmosphere at the Emirates, including a rise in expectations from fans.

However, Arsenal have not won the Premier League since 2004 and last lifted a trophy in 2020 when they won the FA Cup.

In the past couple of seasons manager Mikel Arteta has made a point of speaking about the importance of the fans in the stadium and wanting to “generate the best atmosphere in the world at the Emirates”.

Arteta regularly now delivers messages to supporters in his pre-match news conferences.

He has asked them to arrive early, and before the Crystal Palace match on Sunday he said he wanted supporters to “play the game with us” and “be in your seat with a certain behaviour, with a certain body language”.

So what are Arsenal doing to increase the noise?

One of the visible changes that came this season was that Arsenal removed the cover from the players' tunnel.

This was done so Arsenal players and, crucially, the opposition can hear the noise before kick-off.

It has also meant that supporters in that area can connect with players, and there have been numerous pictures of players high-fiving and interacting with fans as

four points clear at the top of the Premier League after nine games - as they fight to lift the title after three successive second-place finishes.

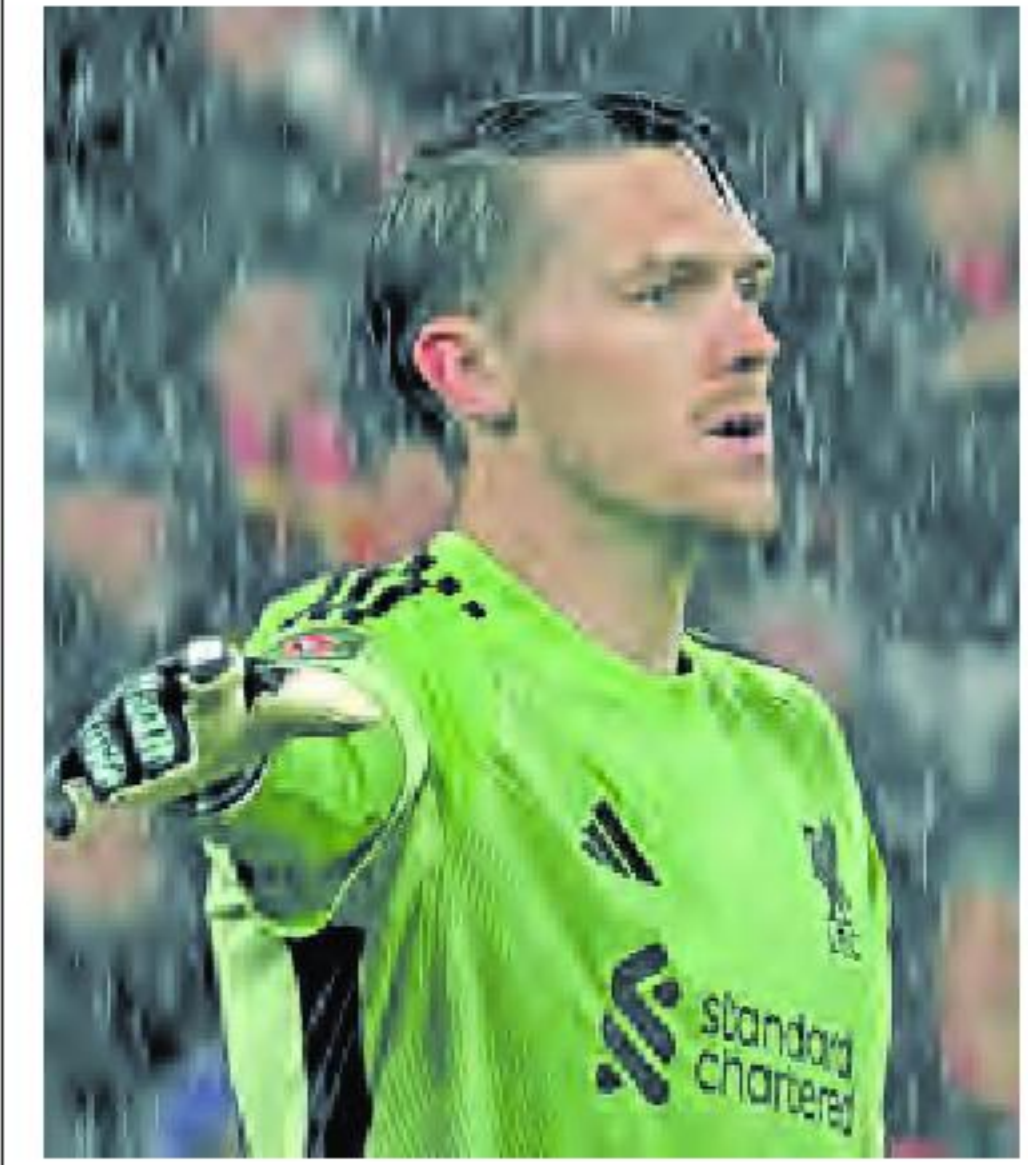
But concerns remain about the atmosphere at Emirates Stadium.

When it rains, it pours for Liverpool

Liverpool boss Arne Slot defended his decision to name a much-changed side after a 3-0 League Cup exit to Crystal Palace on Wednesday extended the Reds' miserable run.

The Premier League champions have now lost six of their last seven matches in all competitions, including their last four in the league.

Slot made his priorities clear before kick-off by making 10 changes, with the likes of Virgil van Dijk and Mohamed Salah left out of the squad completely.

A youthful selection were easily picked off by Palace, who have now beaten Liverpool three times this season.

Ismaila Sarr struck twice in the first half before Yeremy Pino added a third late on after Liverpool substitute Amara Nallo was sent off.

“It's not Liverpool standards to lose six out of seven,” said Slot, who used a big week ahead as justification for his team selection.

Liverpool will aim to snap their Premier League losing streak against in-form Aston Villa on Saturday.

Real Madrid then visit Anfield in the Champions League on Tuesday before a trip to Manchester City on November 9.

“I couldn't have brought them (the first team regulars) into a situation where they had to go into a week like this.

“We have a game tonight, then it's only two days to rest, play the next one, only two days' rest, play Real Madrid and then a few days more Manchester City.

“Everyone can have his opinion about it, but with the squad we have, maybe 15 or 16 first team players available, this is the choice I've made.”

FA Cup winners Palace have more silverware in their sights, but were handed another difficult draw away to Arsenal in the quarter-finals. [AFP]
